#### **COLLABORATION STATIONS**

Collaboration Stations allow small groups of students to gather around a spacious work table and large computer monitor. The monitor features multiple device inputs so that students can connect their devices and work together electronically.

Roberta A. Smith's generous gift to Muskingum University honors her parents, Margaret Fleming Arndt Poland, a member of the Class of 1909, and Chester Harrison Poland.

When Margaret Fleming Arndt enrolled at Muskingum more than a century ago, she chose as her major "elocution" — a highly-prized pursuit for young ladies of her time. She noted in her yearbook profile that giving speeches was her favorite pastime.

Margaret's love of reading, learning, and communicating her ideas was brought to fruition during her time on campus. She and Chester shared this legacy with their family.

Today, that same historic Muskingum tradition of excellence endures within the Roberta A. Smith University Library. The state-of-the-art facilities, resources, and technologies will provide Muskingum students of today and tomorrow with the skills to meet the opportunities and challenges presented by our ever-changing global economy and society.

#### D. Thompson and Darlene J. McCalmont Colloqium Center

Library visitors are welcomed to the **Philip and Betsey Caldwell Library Commons** through the Bonkovsky and Bonkowsky Entryway to Higher Learning and Service.

The two-story, glass-walled **D. Thompson and Darlene J. McCalmont Colloquium Center** features a projection wall, the Dan and Anita Plumly Fireplace, and comfortable seating and café tables to encourage student gatherings. When hosting speakers and video presentations, its furnishings stow away to accommodate theatre-style seating for up to 100 attendees.

The **Bob and Jane Conley Lounge**, the gateway to the Colloquium Center from the library's central atrium, honors U.S. Marine Brigadier General Robert Conley '41, Jane Reed Conley '43, and U.S. Marine Captain Robert Frank Conley '65, who sacrificed his life for our country in the Vietnam conflict.







#### Marshall and Eileen Phelps Reading Terrace, Boardroom and Classroom

The **Marshall and Eileen Phelps Reading Terrace** spans the front of the library to the right of the main entrance doors, and includes the building's cornerstone. The cornerstone scripture verse is the same inscription chosen when the prior library — which formed the core of the new structure — was constructed in 1959.

The **Marshall and Eileen Phelps Boardroom** and the **Marshall and Eileen Phelps Classroom** are located on the upper and entry levels respectively. They offer inspiring views of the Montgomery Fountain Plaza and Montgomery Hall. The Phelps Boardroom will be available to members of the campus community for seminars, presentations, and conferences, as well as serving as the meeting place for the Muskingum University Board of Trustees.




The D. Craig and Sally Nordlund Welcome Center is home to the main circulation desk, central library operations areas, and works from the University Art Collection. It is located just beyond the James R. Gray Lobby and the Mabel Warren Anderson Foyer.











#### **University Art Collection**

The University Art Collection has been established through several important gifts.

Two works by the American artist and illustrator LeRoy Neiman (1921-2012) were given through the generosity of the LeRoy Neiman Foundation. Internationally known for his scenes of sports and entertainment, Neiman's vibrant colors and distinctive style chronicled half a century of American pastimes and cultural and sports heroes.

American glass artist Paul J. Stankard's exquisitely detailed botanical works are in the permanent collections of more than 70 prominent international museums, and he created the official United States gift used when formal diplomatic relations were established with the People's Republic of China. Mr. Stankard holds a Muskingum Doctor of Fine Arts degree and has given three works from his personal collection to the University in tribute to the presidency of Anne C. Steele.





### HENRY BULLOCK ESTABLISHES \$10 MILLION PLANNED GIFT



Trustee Henry D. Bullock '77 announces his planned gift that will eventually create Henry D. Bullock Hall.

MuskingumTrustee Henry D. Bullock '77 has committed a \$10 million planned bequest to the University for the future construction of Henry D. Bullock Hall.

Henry Bullock earned his Bachelor of Arts degree cum laude in Philosophy and Economics and was deeply influenced by Professors Joseph B. Elkins and Herbert F.Thomson. He earned his Master of Business Administration degree at the Kellogg Graduate School of Management of Northwestern University and joined Wells Fargo Bank's Real Estate Industries Group where he helped establish the company's first construction finance business in Silicon Valley. His career has included posts directing the Northern California commercial mortgage banking operations of Security Pacific Corporation and as a Managing Partner at the Shidler Group where he was involved in all facets of taking two companies public. One of the companies, First Industrial, still trades on the NYSE (FR) and is the fourth largest publicly held industrial REIT (Real Estate InvestmentTrust).

He is Chairman of the Board of Menlo Equities, which he founded in 1994. Today, the company has \$3 billion in net assets and over seven million square feet of technology-focused commercial real estate throughout California, Oregon, Washington, Arizona, and Texas. Mr. Bullock has served as a Muskingum trustee since 2004 and was previously a member of the Muskingum Alumni Council.





### The Roberta A. Smith University Library is **SOLAR POWERED!**



Muskingum's commitment to creating a "library for the future" extends to the building's use of clean, renewable solar energy.

The rooftop system of 144 solar panels has a 36,000-watt capacity and will generate 43,000 kilowatt hours per year, supplying the library's anticipated electricity needs for the next 25 years.

The solar energy system was made possible through the generosity of D. Thompson '76 and Darlene McCalmont.
