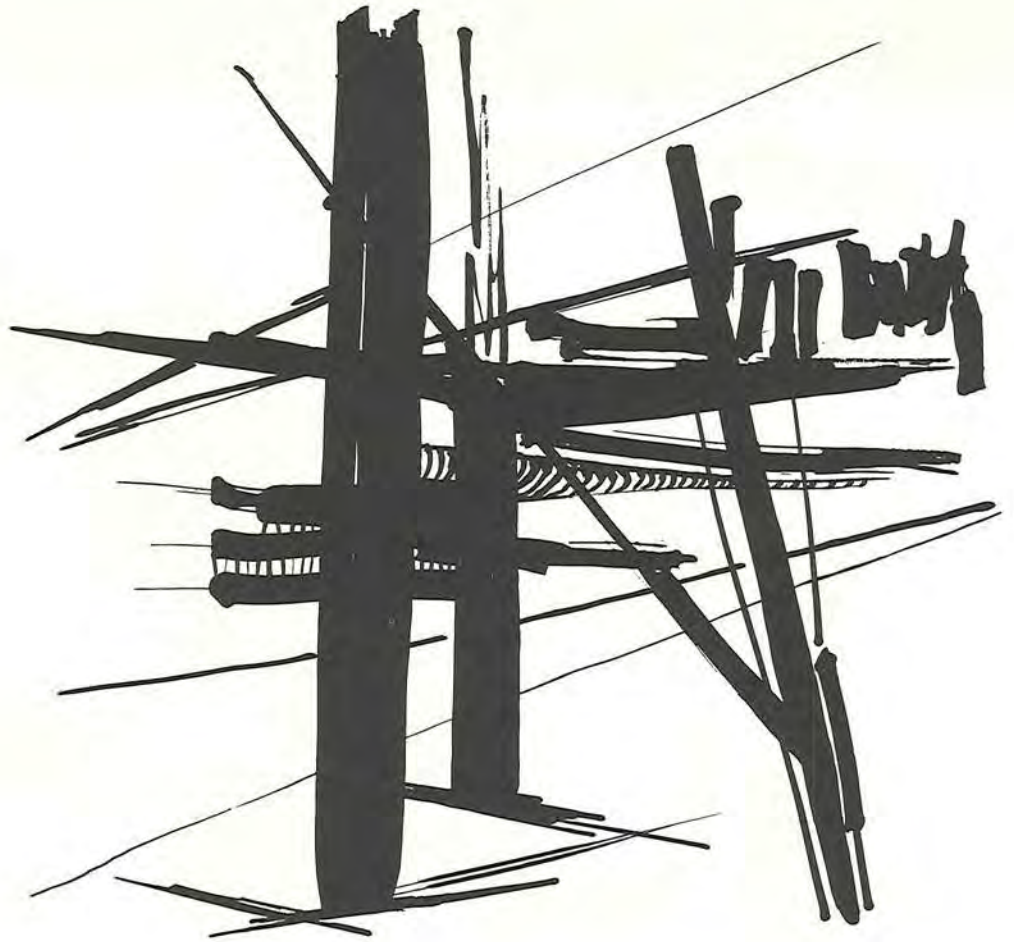

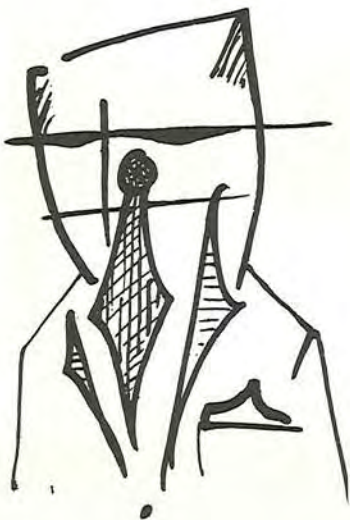




DEDICATION

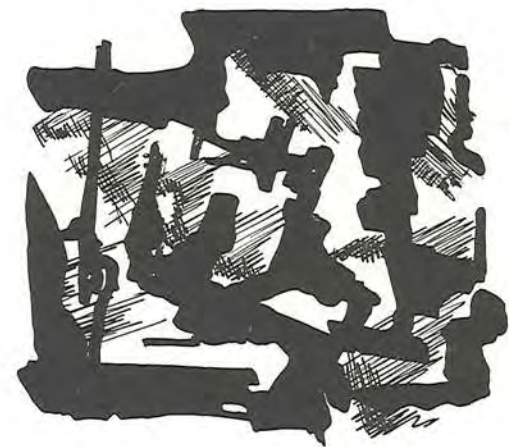

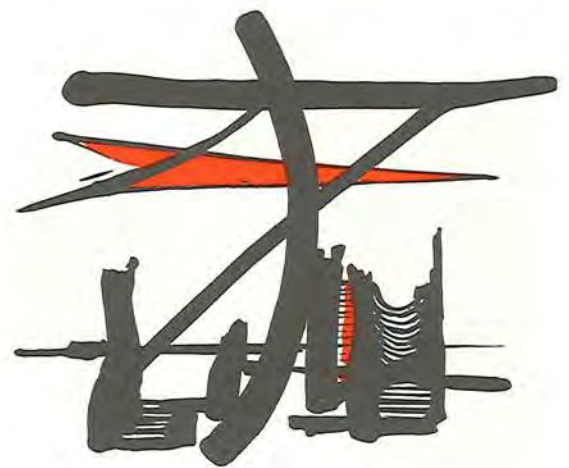

Sound physical development creates a body in which the mind can more efficiently work. At Muskingum the development of the body and its skills is encouraged. For two years classes are taken which cover a wide variety of sports from bowling and modern dance to swimming and tennis. Under competent instruction, the student acquires physical skills which can be a source of pleasure and accomplishment. The extensive physical development program at Muskingum attempts to overcome the general physical inactivity of college students. Non-competitive sports relax the individual and facilitate release of tensions, while competitive sports develop cooperation, teamwork, and sportsmanship. Muskingum has found that through mental and physical development, molding of a more complete individual is achieved.





Muskies of all shapes and sizes found fun and relaxation this year as they participated in the numerous activities offered by the physical education department. Experience, injury, and leadership have been key words for the fighting Muskies this year. When the 1960-61 season opened, only Klein and Benadum were starters from the previous year. Experience was gained the hard way. The cagers lost their first eight times out. Improvement was visibly shown thereafter. In the next six games the Muskies won three, beating Western Reserve, Steubenville, and Rensselaer Polytechnical Institute. From then on the Muskies began to mold into a unit and showed improvement as the season progressed.

Injury was the second key word. Jim Burson, hero of the 1960 football season, suffered a broken collar bone during a football game. He reinjured it playing basketball against Hiram after seeing action in only one varsity game. Don Benadum was lost for a few

games due to a pulled muscle, and Jay Grubb tore the ligaments in his knee.

Leadership, the third key word, is necessary in any team sport. The "take over guy" for the Muskies last year was "Mose" Burson. Without him the team was at a loss for a floor general. The team was paced by George Klein, the high point man for the season. Don Benadum and Don Benson were the only other returning veterans with whom Coach Burkholder had to work.

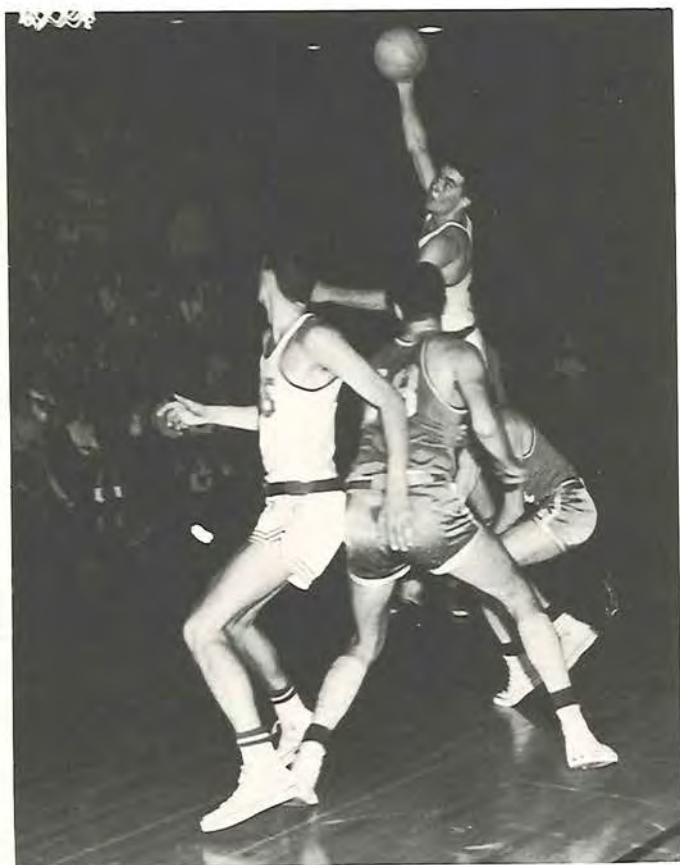

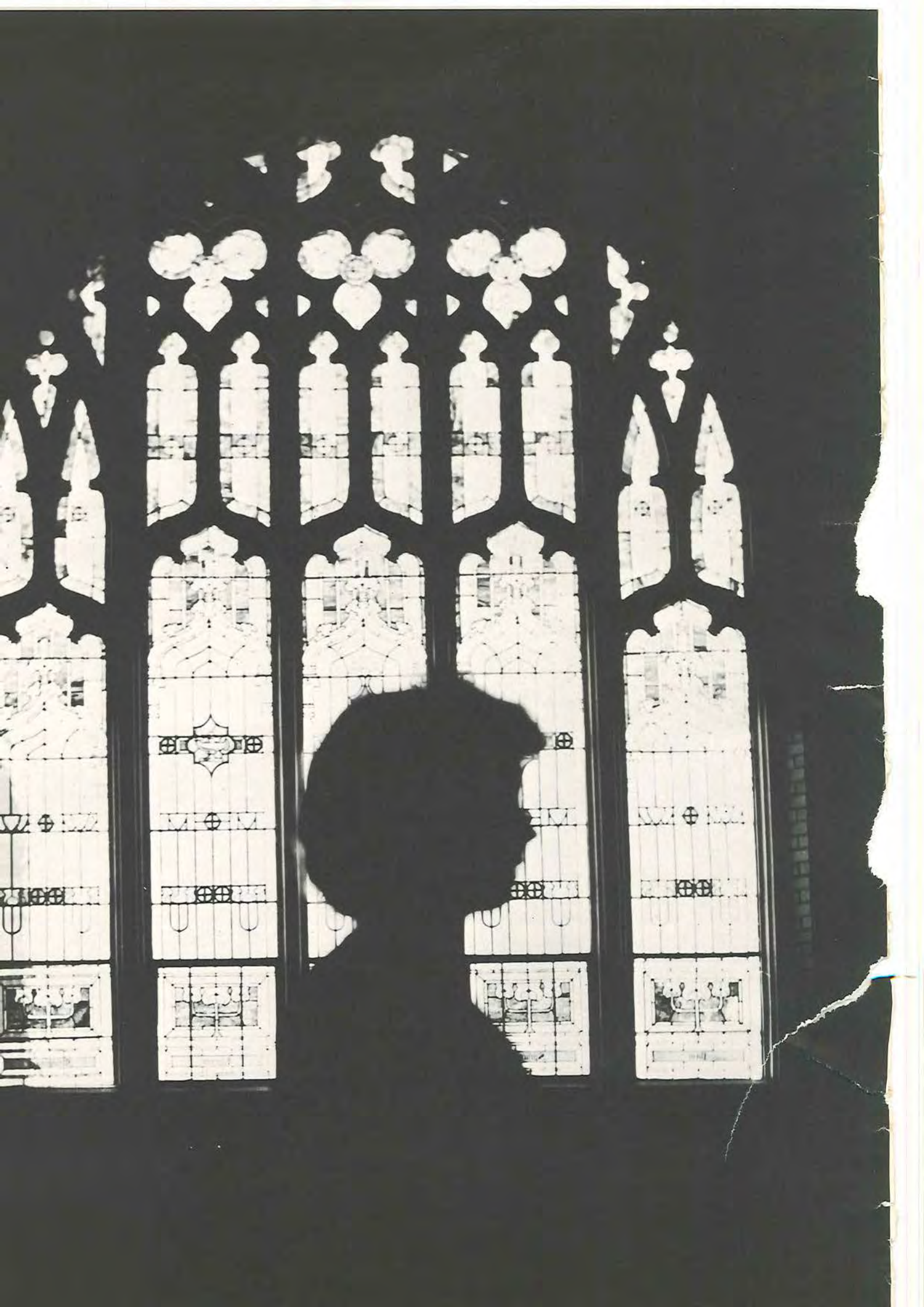
The theme of this year's show was "Progression," featuring eleven numbers, novelties, comedies, floating patterns, duets and solos all based on the abstract theme.

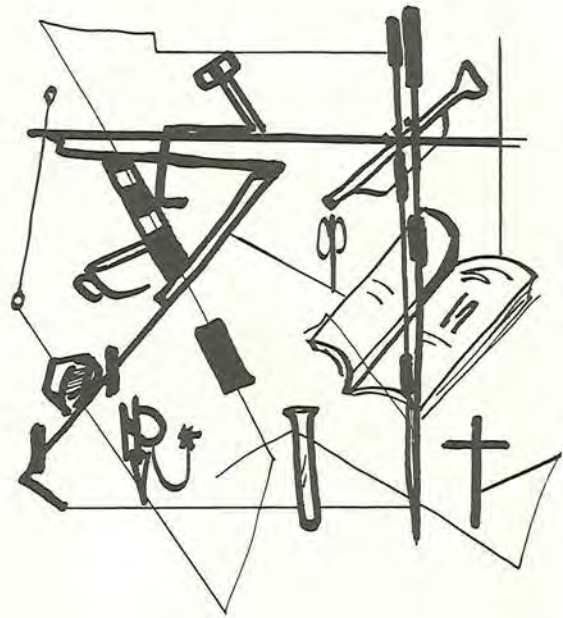
