

In the early 1800's, Scotch-Irish Presbyterians from Pennsylvania began to establish themselves in Muskingum County. The arrival of the old National Road fostered the growth of the settlements in the New Concord area into the village of New Concord. With a strong love for education, the pioneer-citizens of New Concord succeeded in establishing in 1837 a college for Christian young men.

Since its founding, Muskingum has seen vast developments. Twenty-one departments have grown out of three. The College began by offering nine courses; it now offers 328. An endowment of \$1,553,922 was built from literally nothing. Today Muskingum is a member of the American Association of University Women, the National Association of Schools of Music, the Association of American Colleges, the American Council on Education, and the College Entrance Examination Board. Also, it is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The growth and reputation of Muskingum's faculty and alumni illustrates the effectiveness of its educational system. In 1837 Muskingum had a mere faculty of two. Today the College boasts a distinguished faculty of 82. Muskingum prepares its graduates for advanced schools of study as well as for every vocation. The achievements of past graduates speak well for their Alma Mater. Alumni include the late William Oxley Thompson, who was President of Ohio State University for 27 years; the stage and movie star, Agnes Moorehead; and the first President of the University of Chicago, the late William Rainey Harper.



From an enrollment of 17 in 1837, Muskingum has grown into a student body of 1316, while still maintaining the atmosphere of a small Christian liberal arts college. The College's 705 men and 611 women represent 32 states, including Hawaii, and seven foreign countries. This year, the American students have been able to exchange ideas with students from Jordan, Uganda, Germany, Peru, Greece, Iran, and Nigeria. The Junior-Year Abroad Plan has permitted the students to greatly increase their educational experiences, while an exchange program with Hampton Institute has given Muskingum students first-hand encounters with our country's race problems.

...an increased student body ...

Though the academic side of Muskingum is the uppermost, there is another side to the college. In leisure time the students and faculty alike are free to enjoy a great range of activities. Informative lectures, famous artist concerts, fine films are brought to campus. The radio studio and theatre provide entertainment for the student body as well as valuable experience for the participants. A wide range of academic honoraries and interest clubs offer a chance for broadening of classroom experience. A full schedule of social functions sponsored by the social clubs and all-college dances coordinated by the Center Board are also available. There is something for everyone at Muskingum on the extra-curricular as well as the academic level.





For the greater portion of Muskingum's history there were only two buildings one one and onehalf acres of land. The Old Campus, as it is now called, is still there, but added to it are over twohundred additional acres and many more recent buildings.

Brown Chapel, Montgomery Hall, the Student-Faculty Center—these are symbols of Muskingum's growth. They represent something more than just the physical. They reflect a pioneering spirit aimed at granting students every possible opportunity for self-expression and broadening facilities to account for the needs of each and all students.

This anniversary by no means marks an end to Muskingum's expansion. In the future are more new buildings, the renovation of existing ones, and, most important, critical examinations of the curricula.





Muskingum's buildings...

For seventy-five years Muskingum College consisted of two buildings on one and one-half acres of land which is now referred to as the Old Campus. Today Paul Hall, one of those two dignified buildings, have been remodeled to accommodate the Department of Music. Paul Hall bears the name of Dr. David Paul, who was Muskingum's president from 1865 to 1879.

Over half a century old, Brown Chapel maintains its position as the hub of our campus spiritual life. This is the oldest structure on the New Campus, being the first building erected by the late Dr. J. Knox Montgomery. Brown Chapel is named in honor of the late J. M. Brown of Wheeling, West Virginia, who was a generous contributor to the college.

Smells of things scientific in Cambridge Hall inform visitors to Muskingum's campus that this is our building of science. Dedicated in 1929, Cambridge's facilities have been expanded to include the departments of geology, physics, chemistry, mathematics, philosophy, and psychology. Cambridge Hall derives its name from the city of Cambridge, whose residents contributed a large share toward its erection.

Today the main artery of campus life is Montgomery Hall. Built in 1919 and named for the late Dr. J. Knox Montgomery, this building houses administration and faculty offices and most general classrooms. Familiar to Muskingum's students is a large bronze plate inset of the sacred college seal on the floor of the main entrance of this building.

The gymnasium and physical education building

Opened in the spring of 1960, the new library stands as a shining symbol of Muskingum's progress. This building was erected on the site of Flagpole Hill at a cost of over a half million dollars. Offering almost every library service, the new library's facilities have greatly expanded those of the former library in Johnson Hall.

The new Student-Faculty Center represents another mark in Muskingum's progress. Completed in 1960 with the aid of a quarter million dollar loan from the federal government, this ironspot brick and red-tile roofed building satisfies a long-recognized need on our campus. Among its facilities are lounges, dining rooms, bowling alleys, offices for certain student activities, and a bookstore.

Twenty-seven years ago, in 1935, a new health and physical education building rose to replace Muskingum's first gymnasium. Today this building continues to represent one of the finest and most complete plants for physical and health training possessed by any small college.




dormitories...homes away from home.

Three men's and three women's dormitories offer housing facilities to many Muskingum students. Two new faces on the dormitory scene are the Freshman Women's Dormitory and the New Dormitory for Men. Both of these opened in the fall of 1961. Erected in 1922, Patton Hall houses over one hundred twenty freshmen women. Adjoining Kelley Hall, completed in 1956, accommodates two hundred twenty-five upperclasswomen. The names Moore and Memorial are almost synonymous, for these recently built freshman men's dorms share the same lounge, recreation, and dining facilities.



PEOPLE


Students of all kinds, over twelve-hundred of them today, are one answer to the "why" of Mus-kingum. For one hundred twenty-five years of progress of, by, and for them has been made. Going back one hundred twenty-three years, to 1839, Muskingum conferred degrees on two men as her first graduating class, and since then enrollment has been on the increase, especially in recent years.

With the student body has grown the faculty. When Muskingum was fifty years old, there were only four faculty-members for fifty-six students. College expansion has raised this number to over

eighty.

Never before has the demand for well-educated persons been so great. Muskingum's students and faculty are learning from the past, providing for the present, and anticipating the future.

Dr. Robert N. Montgomery serves as president of Muskingum College. He is more than just an administrator however. Freshmen encounter him at a song fest the first day they are at Muskingum. On such occasions he introduces himself as "Dr. Bob" and then sings a stirring rendition of "Put Your Arms Around Me Honey," usually with two encores. This is the essence of Dr. Montgomery. He is a friend, a counselor, a gracious host. He and Mrs. Montgomery together embody the Muskingum friendliness, always giving of themselves to help and encourage Muskingum students. The door of the Manse is opened constantly to all. Dr. and Mrs. Montgomery have set a standard for Muskingum in the last thirty years, a standard of friendship and Christian service which has, to a great extent, made Muskingum what she is today, a Christian College with a perpetual smile.





Over fifty courses in economics and business administration, history, sociology, and political science are offered to students by Muskingum's Social Science Department. Chairmaned by Dr. Fisk, this department seeks to give its students a broad basis for the understanding of social and economic problems and to prepare its majors for teaching and careers in law, government service, and related fields. Economics students consider economic problems of society, while history students examine past ages and apply this knowledge to modern society. 


TRAILWOOD HEIGHTS


SR. WOMEN'S HONORARY 0.0.0.0.





May 11, 1960 was a date which played an important part in Muskingum's history and its relationship to the world. On that day the first charter meeting of McCowa took place. The Muskingum College Council on World Affairs was formed so that the student body, faculty members, and townspeople might gain greater insight into world problems. McCowa offers tours of Washington, D.C., the United Nations, and the Little United Nations Assembly at Indiana University. The speakers at McCowa come from a wide range of political and social backgrounds. Dean Howard V. Evans serves as the executive advisor of Mc-Cowa and Janet Skuce is the president of the organization. The problem of relating the college student to the world in which he lives is being solved in the primary purpose of McCowa keeping the student from being isolated from the events of the world.

The historical view of Muskingum would not be complete without mention of the Debate Squad and its fine work. During the past four years Dr. James Golden has been the chief advisor to the squad. Combined with his coaching and the efforts of the squad members the group has won many significant awards during the years. The national topic for this year was: "resolved that Labor Organizations should be under the jurisdiction of anti-trust legislation." An international flavor was added to the contests this year in the debate between our squad and the debaters from Cambridge University in England. The manager for this year's squad was Chuck Harner. A significant fact in the success of the team is that its four top members all have winning records of at least 75%.

Muskingum's campus newspaper, The Black and Magenta, made its first appearance in December of 1902. Published by "The Black and Magenta Joint Stock Company of New Concord, Ohio," the first issue was a monthly publication consisting of 23 pages. The first issue consisted of several articles by alumni and faculty members. The original predecessor of today's "Hoppin' Around" column was entitled "Locals" and told of a certain young half-back football player who rode on his horse each Saturday afternoon to the end of town to meet a certain young lady. At present, the B. & M., a four-page publication, is edited by Paul Alvarez and appears each week of the school year. With the aid of several student reporters, it brings articles of interest to a cross-section of the Muskingum College population.

In Muskingum's history, the year 1907 saw the publication of the first volume of the Muscoljuan. Dedicated to the late Dr. J. Knox Montgomery, it was edited by Elbert R. Moses, a 1905 transfer student from Wooster College, and consisted of 162 pages. Expansion is the word which best describes the difference between that first Muscoljuan and this one. In 1907 a total of 104 students and 14 faculty members were at Muskingum. The year 1962 brings this Muscoljuan edited by Whitney Scally, to some 1245 students and 93 faculty members. Although history has expanded the number of people reached by this annual publication, it has not changed its basic aim which was in 1907 "to give a true and impartial representation of Muskingum College life."

FRESHMEN MEN'S GLEE CLUB







The 1961 Muskingum football season opened at Marietta where the "Fighting Muskies" ground out a 14-0 victory over the rugged "Pioneers." Sam Miller played an outstanding game both offensively and defensively as he scored both touchdowns and intercepted a pass setting up one of his touchdowns.

The second contest of the year found Muskingum's winning streak snapped at 13 consecutive victories by a powerful Baldwin Wallace team. The "Yellow Jackets," who eventually went on to achieve national recognition, held the Muskies to 6 points as they scored 35. The Muskies only score came on Sam Miller's 10 yard run to climax a 99 yard drive.

In the first home game of the year, the Muskies got back on the winning trail by downing a stubborn Denison eleven. The "Big Red" scored early but the advantage was lost as Tom Frazier intercepted a pass to set up Tom Bixler's one yard touchdown plunge to tie the score 7-7 before the

The second half proved to be a defensive battle as the Muskies scored but once on a one-yard run by Cunningham. The defense turned back several Denison drives highlighted by a thrilling goal line stand with seconds remaining in the game.

Spectators at McConagha stadium saw the Muskies explode offensively as they smashed Mt. Union 36-0. Paced by Sam Miller's two touchdowns and Jim Burson's running and passing, the Muskies remained undefeated in conference play. The defense again was outstanding as they held the "Purple Raiders" scoreless.

Before a large Homecoming crowd, the Muskies presented coach Ed Sherman with his 100th victory by a 23-0 romp over the Heidelberg "Student Princes." The game was hard fought but the passing combination of Burson to Myers sparked the Muskies to victory. On a key play from the Muskies 35, Jim Burson dropped back and threw a 35 yard pass to Tom Myers who outran the Heidelberg defender for his first touchdown of the day.

Later in the game Tom Myers scored his second touchdown to climax an outstanding game by the

Highly acclaimed West Chester State was the next victim of the Muskies as they defeated the "Golden Rams" in their own stadium. This was the first defeat the Rams had experienced in a home contest for five years. Ron Dierks stunned a capacity crowd by returning an intercepted pass 67 yards to pay dirt.

On their next encounter, the Muskies traveled to Akron where they were dealt a crashing blow, 35-14, by the Akron University "Zips." The game was completely dominated by the Zips; the highlights for the Muskies being Sam Miller's 2 yard touchdown jaunt and a touchdown pass to Tom Myers from Jim Burson.

The following week found the Muskies traveling to meet their arch-rivals, the Wooster Scots.

The game proved to be a rugged defensive battle as the Muskingum defensive turned back the Scot invaders time and time again. The first half was played to a scoreless tie as the Muskies were unable to drive the ball out of their own territory. In the second half, the Muskies dominated play as the offense began to click. Tom Bixler climaxed a 57 yard drive with a one-yard plunge and the Muskies went on to win 6-0.

The final game of the season saw the Mid-Ohio champion, Findlay, meet the spirited Muskies. The mighty Muskies proved worthy of the task and downed the "Oilers" 32-0 as the offensive and defensive units both played outstandingly. Highlight of the scoring was a 33 yard field goal by Dick Anderson, his second of the year. This was the final game for fifteen seniors, who in their four years at Muskingum, compiled an incredible record of 31 victories and only 5 defeats.








Sparked by six returning lettermen, the 1961-62 edition of the "Fighting Muskies" placed 3rd in the Ohio Conference and finished with a very commendable 13-9 record. Showing marked improvement over their previous season, the Muskies under the capable tutelage of Robert Burkholder provided top-flight competition for all their opponents. The Muskies were the only team to defeat conference champion Ohio Wesleyan in league play and later showed their dominance over the Bishops by beating them in the Ohio Conference tournament.

The Muskies displayed awesome power as they opened their season with four straight conference wins. Paced by Captain George Klein, Jim Burson, and Joe Arganbright, the Mighty Muskies downed Hiram, Denison, Capitol, and Ohio Wesleyan and became contenders for the Ohio Conference crown.




However, the victory skein was snapped as the cagers met two non-conference foes, Wabash and Cannon. After thumping Adrian, the Muskies traveled to Baldwin-Wallace where they suffered their first conference loss, 72-66. Not to be denied, the Muskie quintet posted conference victories over Wooster, Kenyon, and Heidelberg. Still in contention for the title the Muskies were upset by the Akron Zips. After nosing out Marietta 64-62, the cagers met nationally ranked Wittenberg and suffered their third conference loss. The Muskies closed their regular season by losing a squeaker to Mt. Union and shellacking Otterbein.

In the Conference Tourney, the "Fighting Muskies" dropped Marietta 70-59 and upset the Bishops from Ohio Wesleyan 62-54. The cagers then went on to meet Wittenburg in the semi-finals where they suffered a defeat at the hands of the Tigers, closing out the season with a commendable overall record of 13-9.


P.E.M. CLUB








