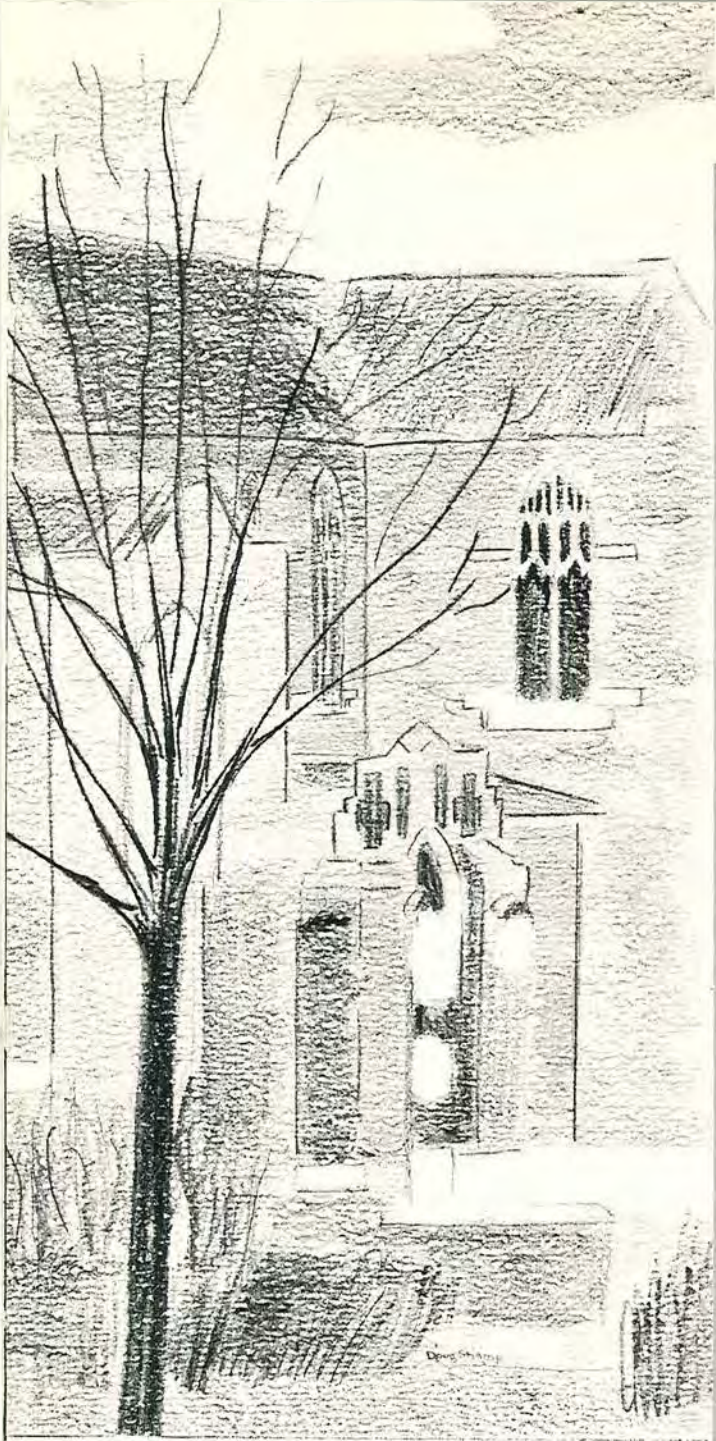

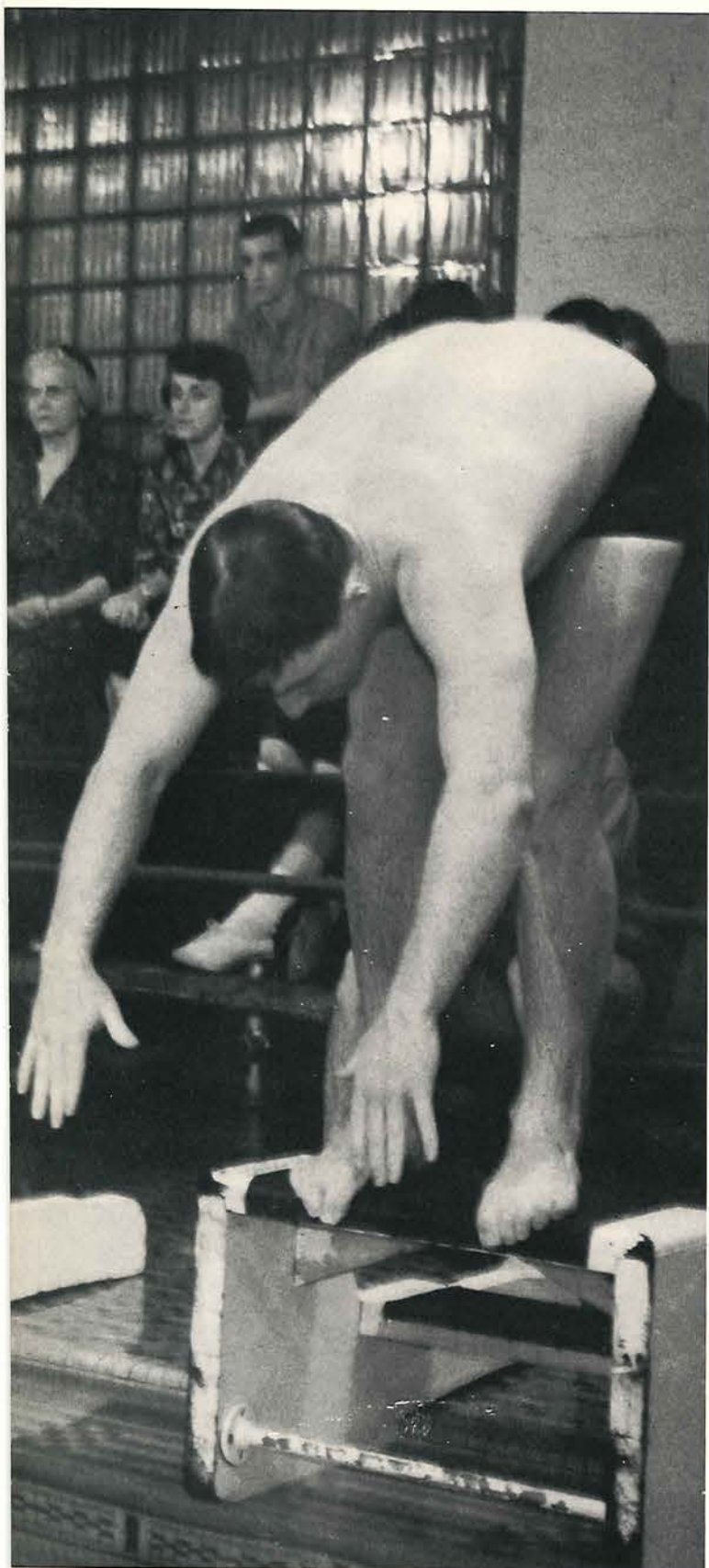

McConagha becomes fourteenth president of Muskingum

Now the fourteenth president of Muskingum College, Dr. Glenn McConagha has replaced Dr. Robert Montgomery, who is presently serving as the first chancellor of this school. As past president, Dr. Montgomery saw Muskingum grow into the institution it now is; he fostered the expansion program which has culminated in a new library, student-faculty center, dormitories, and other facilities as of 1962. In November of 1962, Dr. McConagha was installed as the new president, having filled the post of vice-president since 1953.

Dr. and Mrs. McConagha are by no means recent arrivals on the Muskingum scene. The years of service they have already turned in speak well of their past. Dr. McConagha has served as an educator in many parts of the United States and is familiar with the latest techniques of modern education. He is known internationally for his work in the areas of administration and teaching.

Our new president is an advocate of "a healthy mental, moral, and social climate with full opportunity for intellectual and civic growth." The 1963 *Muscoljuan* takes this opportunity to welcome Muskingum's fourteenth president.

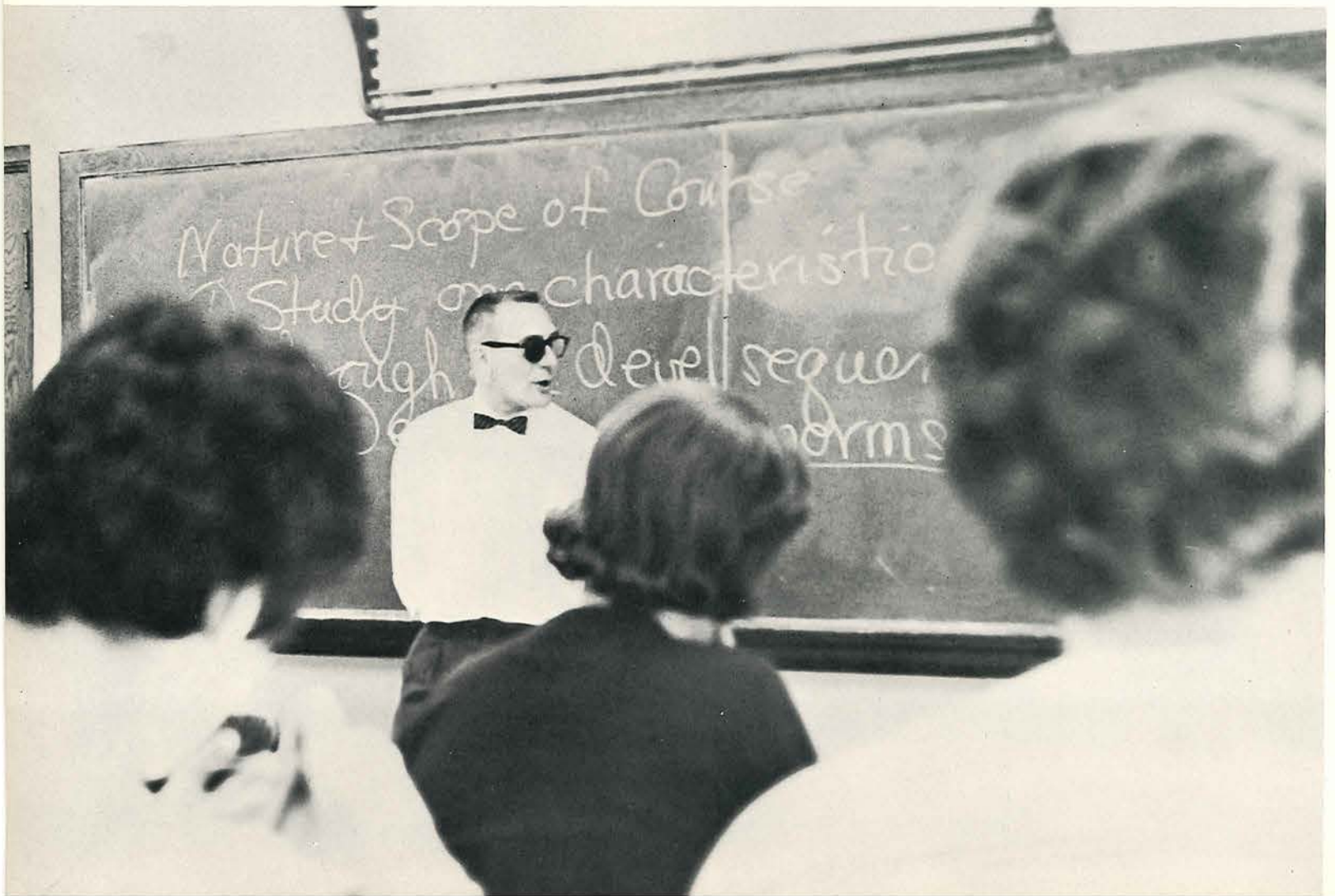

EDUCATION DIVISION *offers practice teaching program*

Motivating a class, handling the unruly child, teaching a student to assume responsibility in today's world: these are some of the problems undertaken by those students in the Division of Education. Many of Muskingum's students will eventually teach, and accreditation requirements are to a large extent fulfilled by this division's courses. Health and physical education majors are trained in personal hygiene, recreation, and physical education. These majors may later find job opportunities in the teaching of health and physical education, physical therapy, and recreational work. Students majoring in home economics are prepared in the area of homemaking both for vocational and personal uses. The students of this division thus receive instruction which is academic and practical in nature. Part of the future teacher's training is fulfilled in the student teaching jobs available in the New Concord area. In this way prospective school instructors gain first-hand experience in their life's work.

LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE DIVISION *adds instructors*

Modern living would seem to have lessened the importance of the values of language and literature, but the increasing introspective forms of self-expression reveal a "new birth" in this area. Fostering those who study language, literature and speech are the able members of this division, headed by Dr. King. Evaluations and critical examinations of world literature are undertaken by English majors. The number of languages offered in this division are now six: Greek, Latin, French, German, Spanish and Russian. Essential for work in many fields, among them teaching, drama, public relations, radio and television, is instruction in speech. Through an integrated liberal arts program, those Muskingum students who study in this division's program attain competence in writing, skill in speaking, and insights into the meanings of great literature.

MATH AND SCIENCE DIVISION

deals with physical world

Today's scientific world sounds a note not discordant or inharmonious with the liberal arts education Muskingum offers. Rather, science majors find their training complimented by various phases of a liberal education, and conversely, liberal arts majors find a great deal added to their backgrounds when these are complimented by science. The facilities of Cambridge Hall, home base of the Mathematics and Science Department, lend to the knowledge students acquire about their physical world. Science and Mathematics majors are readied for work in teaching, engineering, dentistry, and medicine.

The Division of Natural Science offers courses in biology, chemistry, geology, geography, mathematics, and physics. Class lectures, laboratory studies, and individual research and application all contribute to the student's understanding of the physical world and its complexities. Under a special set-up known as the "3-2 plan," engineering students spend three years studying at Muskingum and an additional two years at an accredited engineering institution thereupon receiving degrees from both institutions.

works to develop creative initiative in its students

Fostering the creative abilities of their students is the goal of the members of the Art and Music Division. Through an intensive program of practice, individual students develop and strengthen skills in areas such as painting, drawing and appreciation of art, and vocal and instrumental music. Mr. Kendall chairmans this division with facilities in Johnson and Paul Halls. A variety of careers are available to music and art majors: commercial drawing, professional vocal and instrumental work, and teaching are exemplary. Many students, however, participate in these courses out of individual interest and thereby add a new depth to their cumulative educations.

The division sponsors several activities each year, such as the art show in the library during the month of February, which consisted of paintings done by Mr. Blakesley. At the beginning of the school year a three-evening concert of Beethoven's ten violin sonatas was presented by Professors John Kendall and Wilber Schnitker.

LIFE AND THOUGHT DIVISION *inspects values and conduct*

The study of man, from the rods and cones in his eyes to the question of his origin on this planet, is the very broad subject matter handled by the Life and Thought Division. Psychology students are concerned with man's behavior and the "why" of its occurrence. They probe into the studies made by many authorities in order to obtain answers to their questions. Laboratory periods enable them to repeat experiments and to thereby gain a comprehensive understanding of behavior and related areas. The answers to questions which have been thought about for thousands of years are considered by Philosophy students. Logic, ethics, aesthetics, metaphysics, and the theory of knowledge are among the topics studied. An examination of the world's great religions and a concentrated study of Christianity give students a fuller appreciation and knowledge of this important field. The Bible and its interpretation are particularly emphasized. Basic Education requires that all students take introductory courses in these areas, and those who go beyond these basics may become eligible to teach them.

SOCIAL SCIENCE DIVISION

studies society's patterns

A study of the social sciences; of which Muskingum offers courses in history, sociology, political science, and economics and business administration; enables students to better understand the present world through the heritage we have gained from the past and to better be able to predict future consequences. History students delve into the problems confronted by ancient, medieval, and modern civilizations. An examination of the social group and its relevance to individual human behavior is undertaken by sociology students. Political science majors consider the foundations on which governments are built. Economics issues are explored by students of economics and business administration. The Division of Social Sciences is under the chairmanship of Dr. William Fisk.

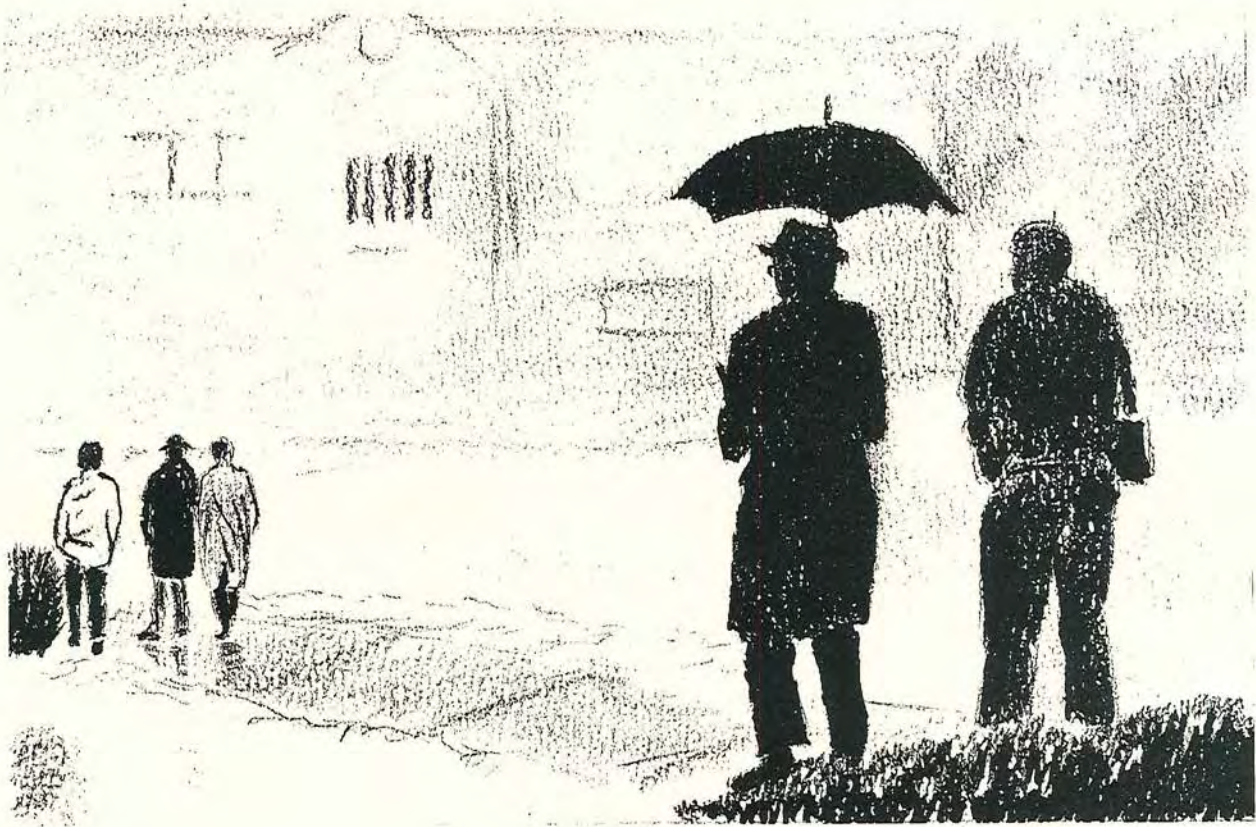

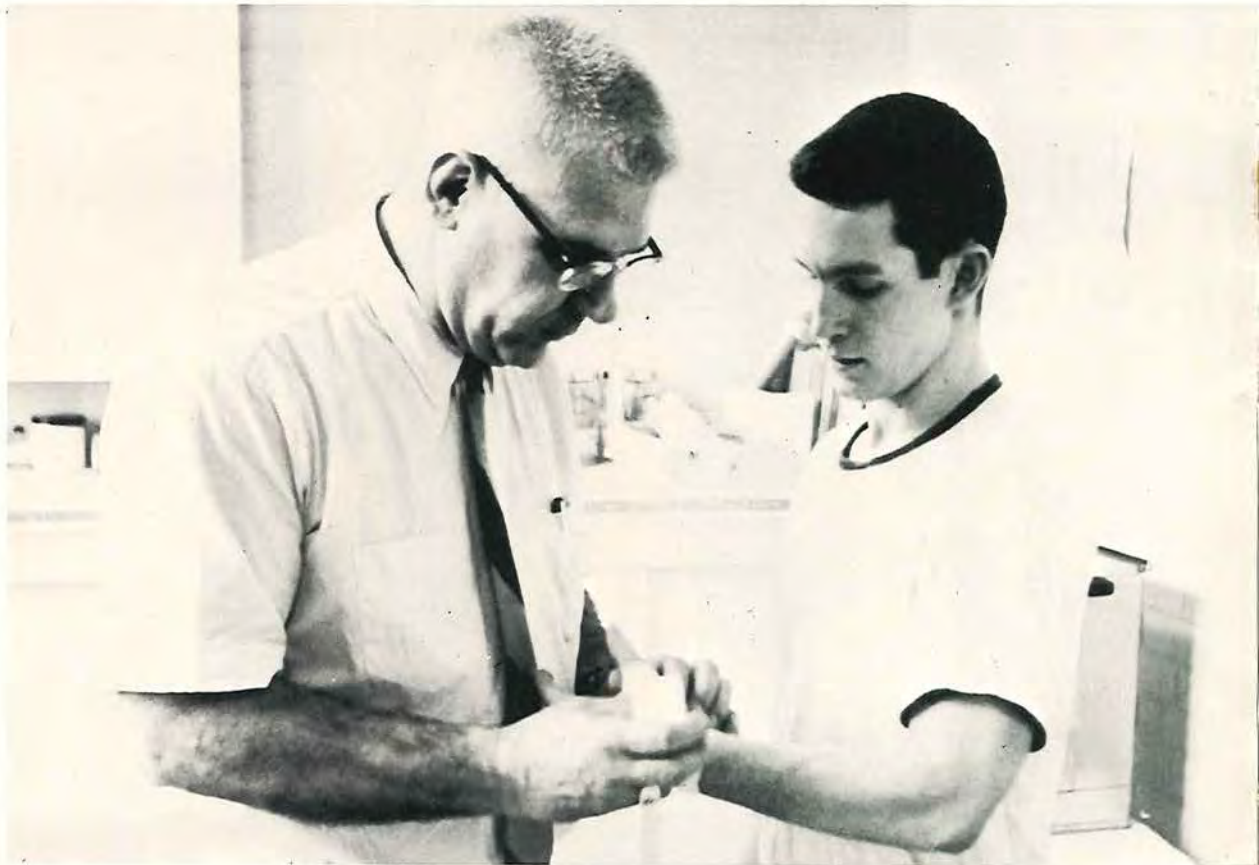

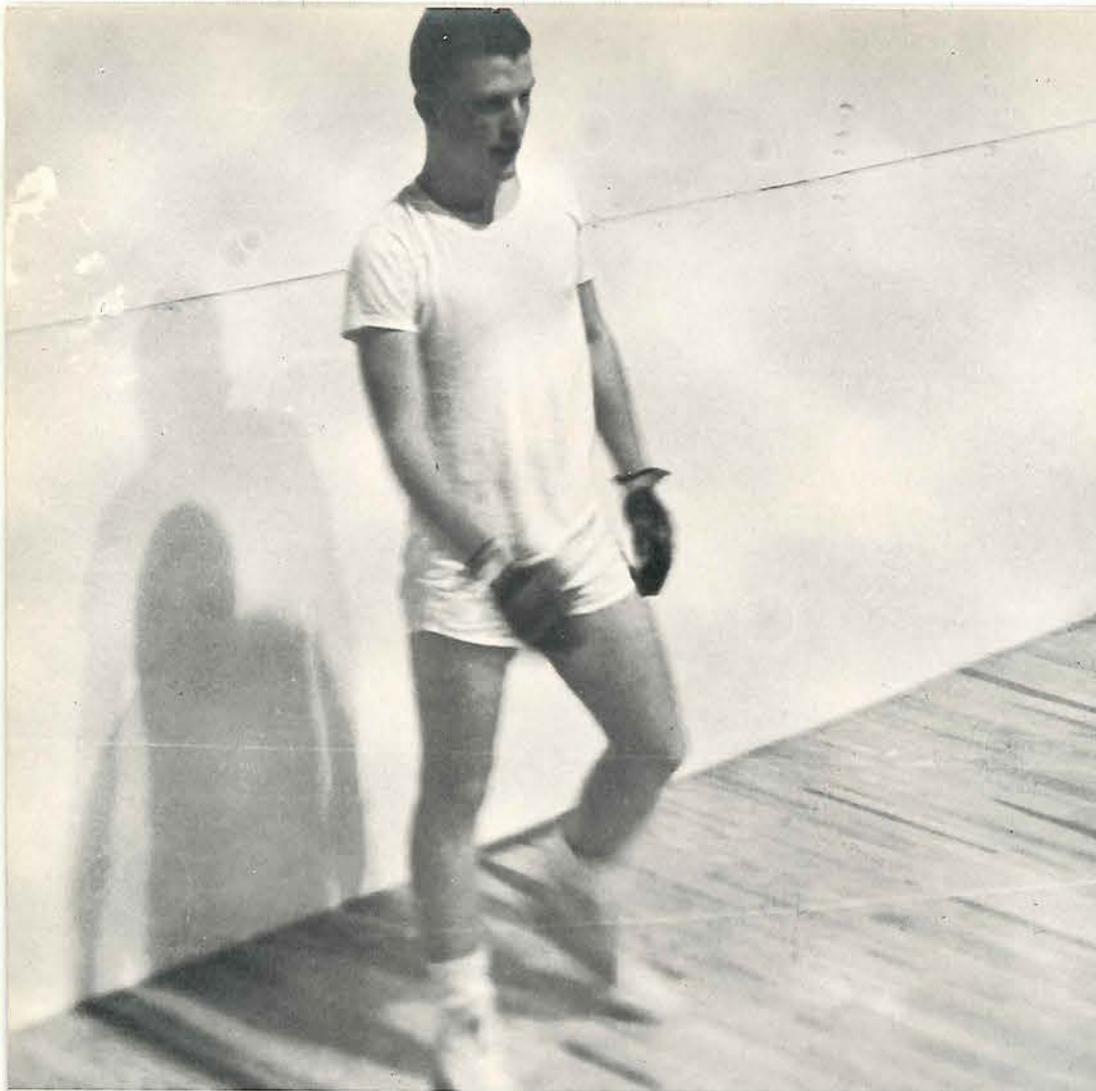

Set up as a community within a community is Trailwood Heights, home of married Muskingum students. Established in September of 1946, Trailwood Heights is more than just a place where married couples reside; it is an integral part of the college, contributing to Muskingum's total life.

Twelve families have set up housekeeping in the trailer homes and barracks designated for this purpose. Elected each year is a mayor; this year's mayor is Dave Myers. Town meetings are held every two weeks and community projects are planned—the preparation of a homecoming float, the annual Christmas party, and cook-outs.

Trailwood Heights sprang into existence soon after World War II when several married couples entered school. Six barracks were constructed by the Federal Public Housing Administration in 1946, and this community has grown gradually ever since.

The spirit of fellowship which prevails at Trailwood Heights is indicative of the interest these young people have in maintaining a satisfactory domestic life. Many of the members of this community are recognized as campus leaders, and through active participation in college activities they have proved that it is possible to attend college and to maintain a comfortable home life as a married student at the same time.



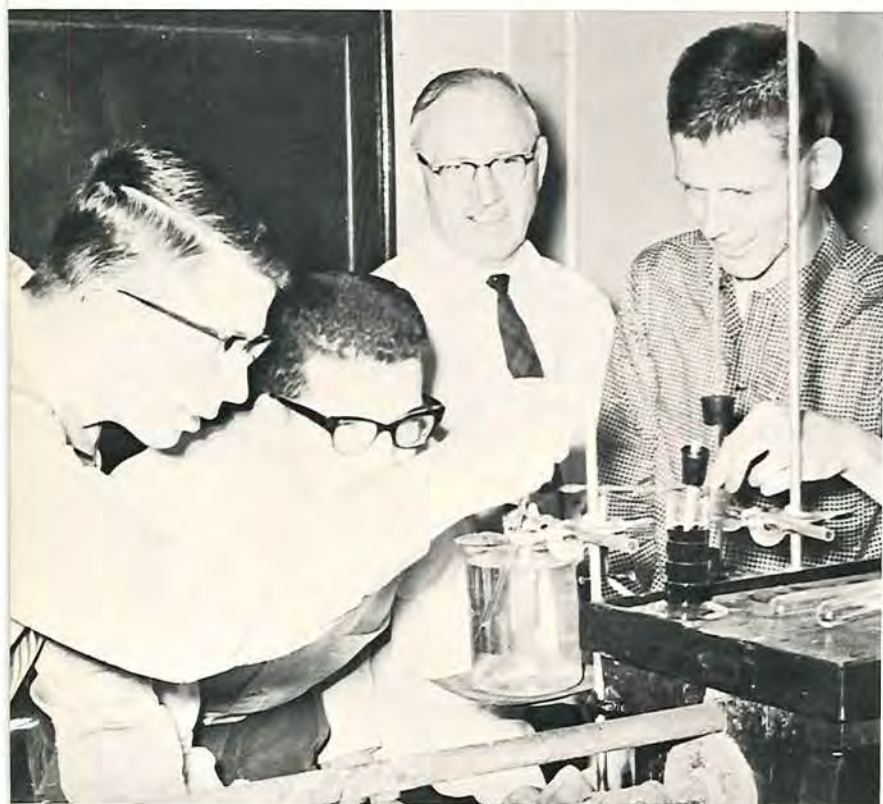

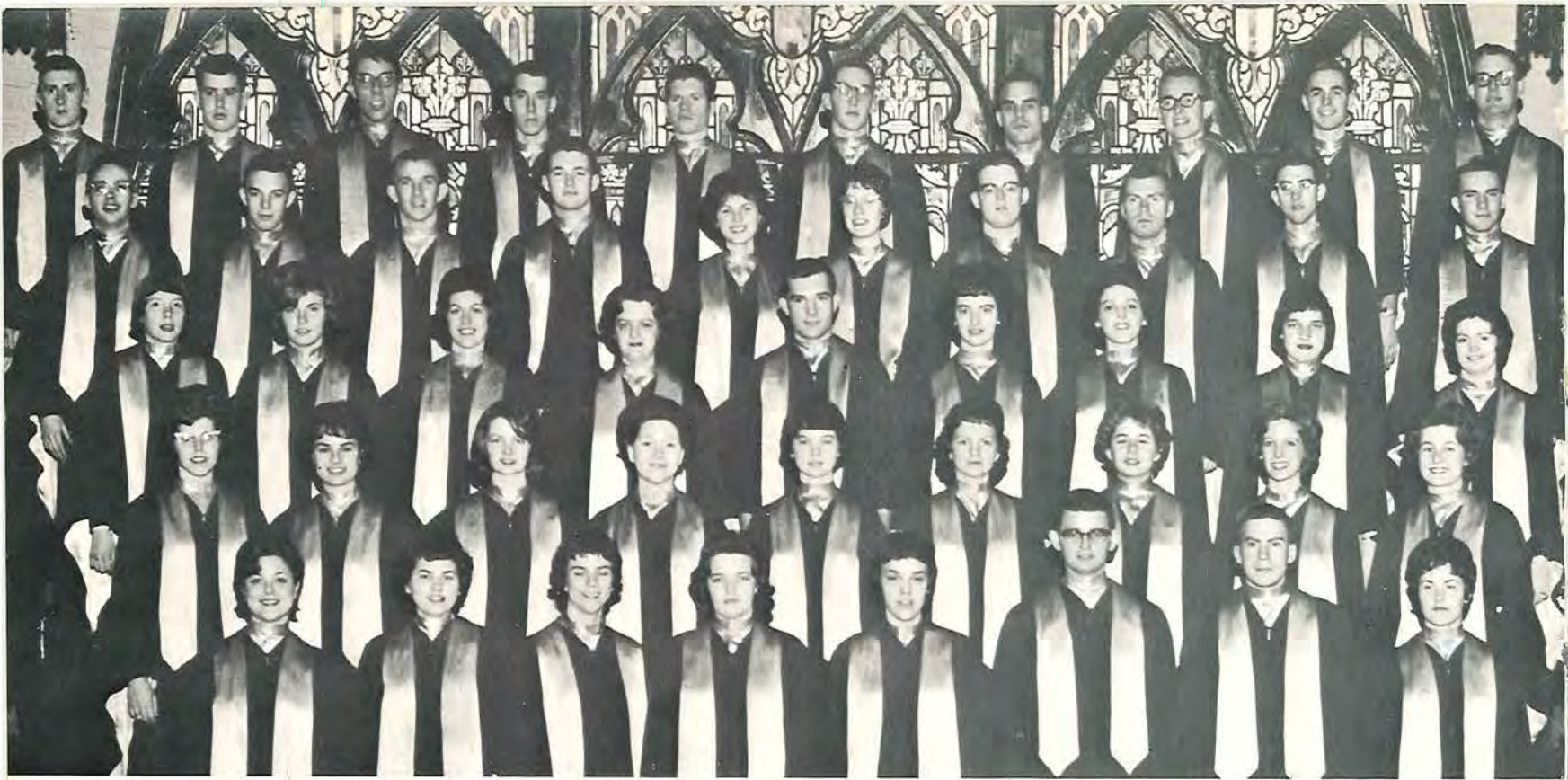

John Birch speaker sets forth views at McCOWA meeting

Founded in 1960, McCowa, Muskingum College Council on World Affairs, has already had a great impact on our campus. McCowa strives to broaden student interest and understanding of world events by bringing speakers to our campus who are closely connected with the happenings themselves. For example, a British diplomat spoke on Britain's proposed entry into the European Common Market, a John Birch Society member presented his views, and a Yugoslavian diplomat discussed whether his country was leaning toward the East or West. McCowa takes no stand on the issues presented but merely provides Muskingum students with a chance to hear what is usually another side of the story. The bi-monthly meetings provide students with facts which are seldom to be found in newspapers and magazines.

Financing the publication with outside gifts and money from their own pockets, these two young men pooled their talents to create one of the best young "mind trusts" that Muskingum College might ever be expected to produce. They continued their adventure into the land of literary capers until their demise in the spring of 1962, when they were relieved of their positions for publishing a philosophical discourse of "questionable taste."

This year's editors of the I.L.A. endowed publication (G. R. Madaras, II, S. Russell, B. French, and A. Chancellor) have striven to perpetuate their predecessors' fine literary form. Truly throwing themselves into their work, they have added both legitimacy and a new format to the satirical magazine. Intellect with a sense of humor is the rare gift that this staff possesses, . . . and a campus magazine of the highest literary quality is the gift which they have bestowed to Muskingum.

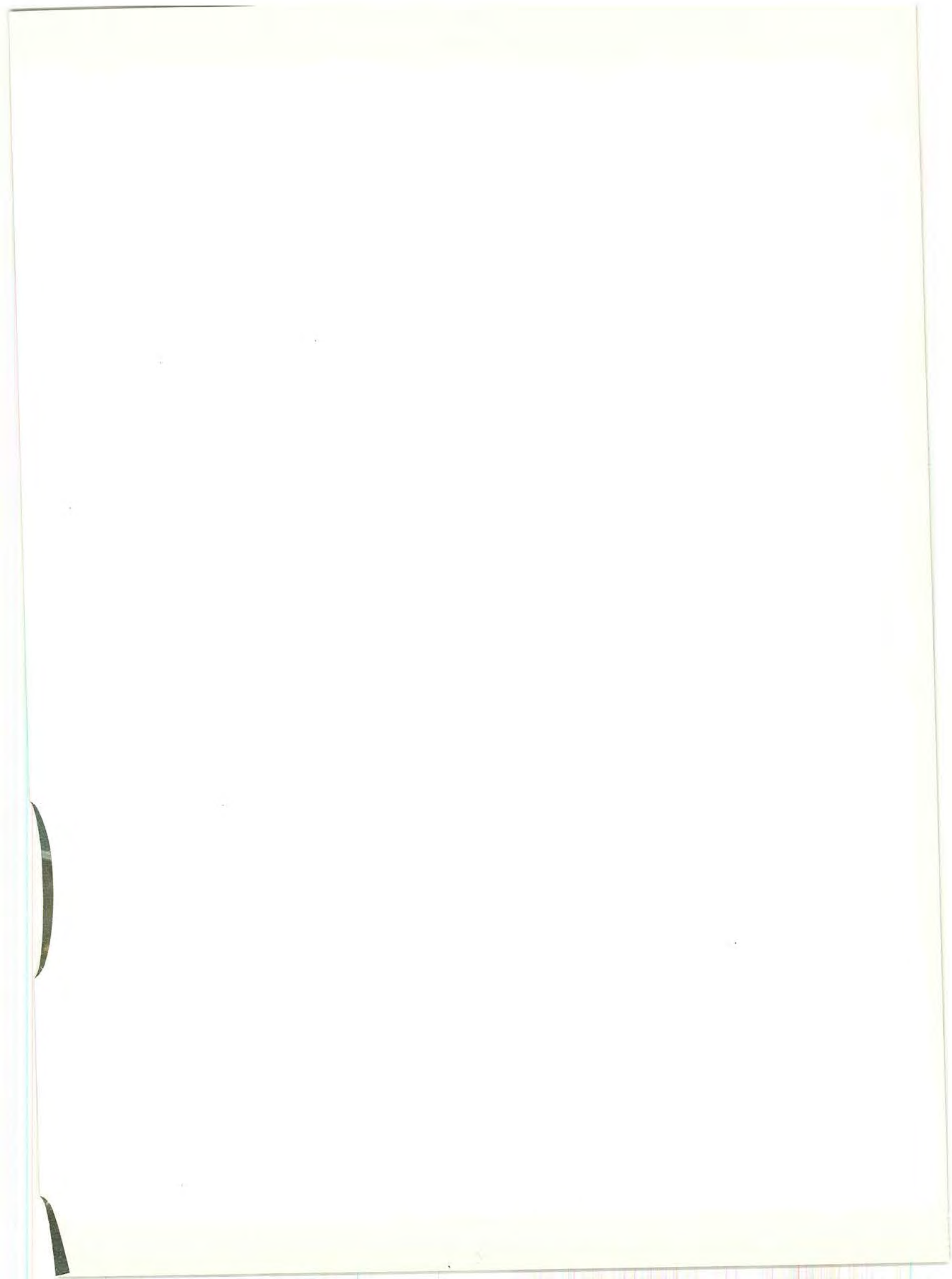

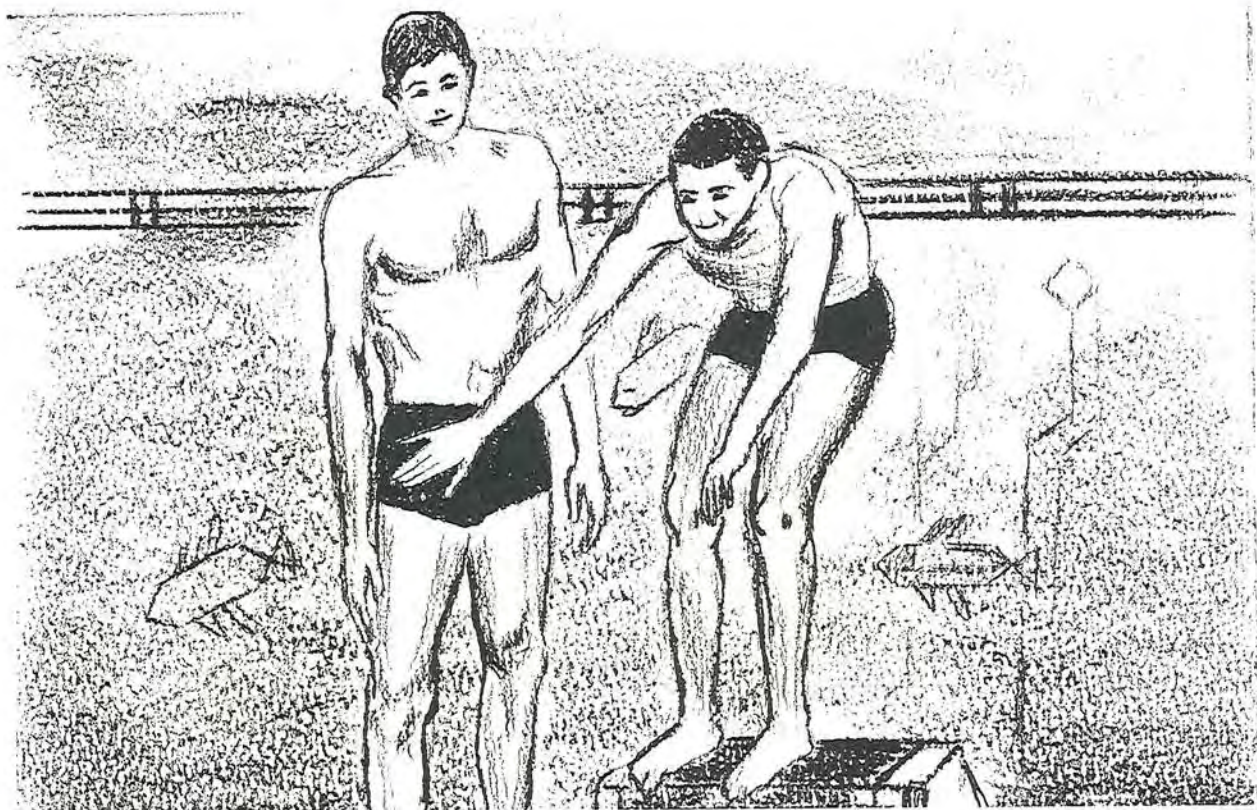

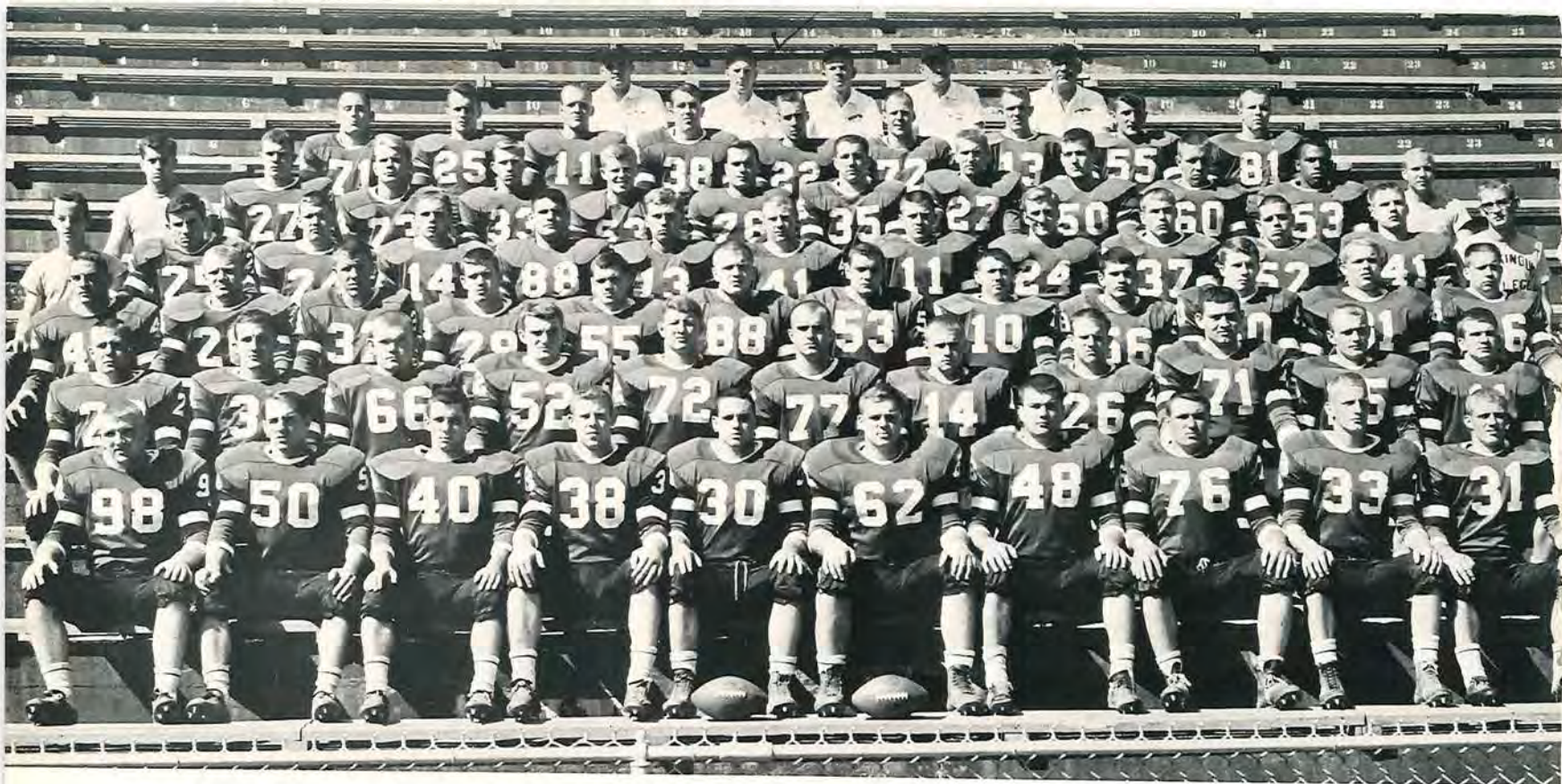

On September 22, the "Fighting Muskies" of Muskingum College, under head coach Ed Sherman, opened their 1962 season against the Akron Zips. The Muskies made a good showing in the first half and when the teams went to the dressing rooms the score was 7-6 in favor of Akron. Led by George Deo, Akron came to life in the second half and took command of the ball game. The Muskies' lone score came when Jim Burson rolled around left end and passed to Dick Moon in the end zone. The top ground gainer for Muskingum was Tom Bixler with 57 yards in 17 carries. The final score was Akron 14, Muskingum 6.

The next week Muskingum evened its conference record at 1-1 with a stunning 58-0 victory over the southern Ohio rival, Marietta. The hard charging Muskie backs gained 384 yards on the ground and 71 yards in the air. Among the many Muskingum stars was the surprise freshman fullback, Don Foutz, who carried the ball 17 times for 135 yards. Roger Post and Dave Houtan made fine showings in the second half when they alternated at the quarterback position.

Muskingum ruined Denison's homecoming with a thrilling 14-7 come-from-behind victory. Denison led 7-6 at the half time, but the large migration day crowd from Muskingum cheered wildly late in the fourth quarter when Muskingum rallied.

MUSKIES *bounce back after dropping opener to Akron*

Jim Burson passed to Skip Kifer on the Denison 1 yard line. On the next play Tom Bixler scored and Burson passed to Dick Moon for the extra points, to give the Muskies a 14-7 victory. Once again the Big Red of Denison failed to break the Muskingum jinx which Coach Sherman seems to use against them.

Muskingum pulled another fourth quarter victory out of the fire the following week when they met Mt. Union, coached by Ken Wable, a former coach here at Muskingum. Neither team could move the ball until the fourth quarter when, with five minutes left to play, Bixler scored from the 1 and Moon added the extra point. Mt. Union roared back and with only seconds remaining scored a touchdown. Mike Rozecki broke up the try for the extra point and Muskingum won, 7-6.

For the third time in a row coach Ed Sherman's Muskies pulled a fourth quarter rally, this time at the expense of Heidelberg. Heidelberg led 3-0 at half time and it looked like the Student Princes would once again upset the Muskies, as in the 1959 game. The defensive teams dominated play in the third quarter and for most of the fourth. Late in the fourth quarter the Muskies finally got a drive going which was highlighted by Tom Bixler's 59 yard run from his own 27 yard line. A few plays later Muskingum scored and held on to even the game 6-3. Muskingum football fans rightfully hoped that this would be the end of those heart-stopping last minute victories. To win by a large score would be a welcome change of events.

Three closing-second wins

The next game was considerably easier than the previous three, and the Muskies overwhelmed the Capital Lutherans, 35-0, on a rain soaked field. The strong Muskingum defense held Capital to 5 first downs and 19 yards rushing. Defensive standouts were Roger LaLonde, Gerry Young, Roger Campbell, Steve Kokovich, Bob Hensel, and Dale Stansbury. The outstanding offensive play of the game was a 58 yard punt return by Roger Welsh.

A Homecoming win over Wooster, 28-0, boosted the Fighting Muskies' season to 6-1. This was the fourteenth consecutive victory for Muskingum over the Scots. A new backfield combination of Post, Kifer, Bixler, and Foutz worked well all afternoon. The biggest surprise of the game was a halfback pass play which worked perfectly for three touchdowns, two thrown by Kifer and one by Frazier. The Muskies dominated every phase of the game and tough Tom Bixler led the rushing attack with 135 yards.

The Muskies continued their winning ways as they soundly trounced highly regarded Waynesburg, 25-6. Up until this game Waynesburg had been enjoying one of its best seasons in recent years. Muskingum had the team well scouted and as a result, was able to charge the middle of the line for big gains. Tom Bixler and Don Foutz did most of the ball carrying for the Muskies.

Tom Frazier, Dale Stansbury, and Tom Tuxill were named to the second team.

Several outstanding freshman and the returning lettermen will form a good nucleus around which Coach Ed Sherman can build another strong team for 1963. Good teams, good sportsmanship, and a lot of gametime thrills all go together to form the tradition at Muskingum as we look forward to another successful football season.

Probably one of the most outstanding games was against Wabash as the Muskies tromped them 95-60, with sparkling all-around play. As far as individual performances are concerned, senior guard Jim Burson came up with 38 points in a close 79-73 win over Wooster. The loss to Denison 75-74, and the loss to Kenyon 84-66 were no doubt the low points of the season for the cagers; however, they did manage to break the 100 point barrier once during the season by blasting Lawrence Tech 104-67. In the Ohio Conference Tournament and last game for the three senior starters, Burson, Woolard, and Stein, Muskingum once again lost to the Big Red of Denison 60-53.

Jim Burson shot for an average of 16.2 points per game to lead the team in scoring, followed by Joe Arganbright and Tom Stein with averages of 10.9 and 10.2 points per game respectively. Senior forward Dick Woolard led the team in free throw percentage, hitting on 76 per cent of his attempts, while vastly improved sophomore center Fred Vollrath led the team in field goal percentage with 45 per cent and also led in rebounding by snagging 234. Although Burson, Woolard, and Stein graduate this year, sophomores Joe Arganbright and Fred Vollrath will be returning along with several experienced freshmen to brighten the basketball picture for Coach Bob Burkholder and the Muskies next year.

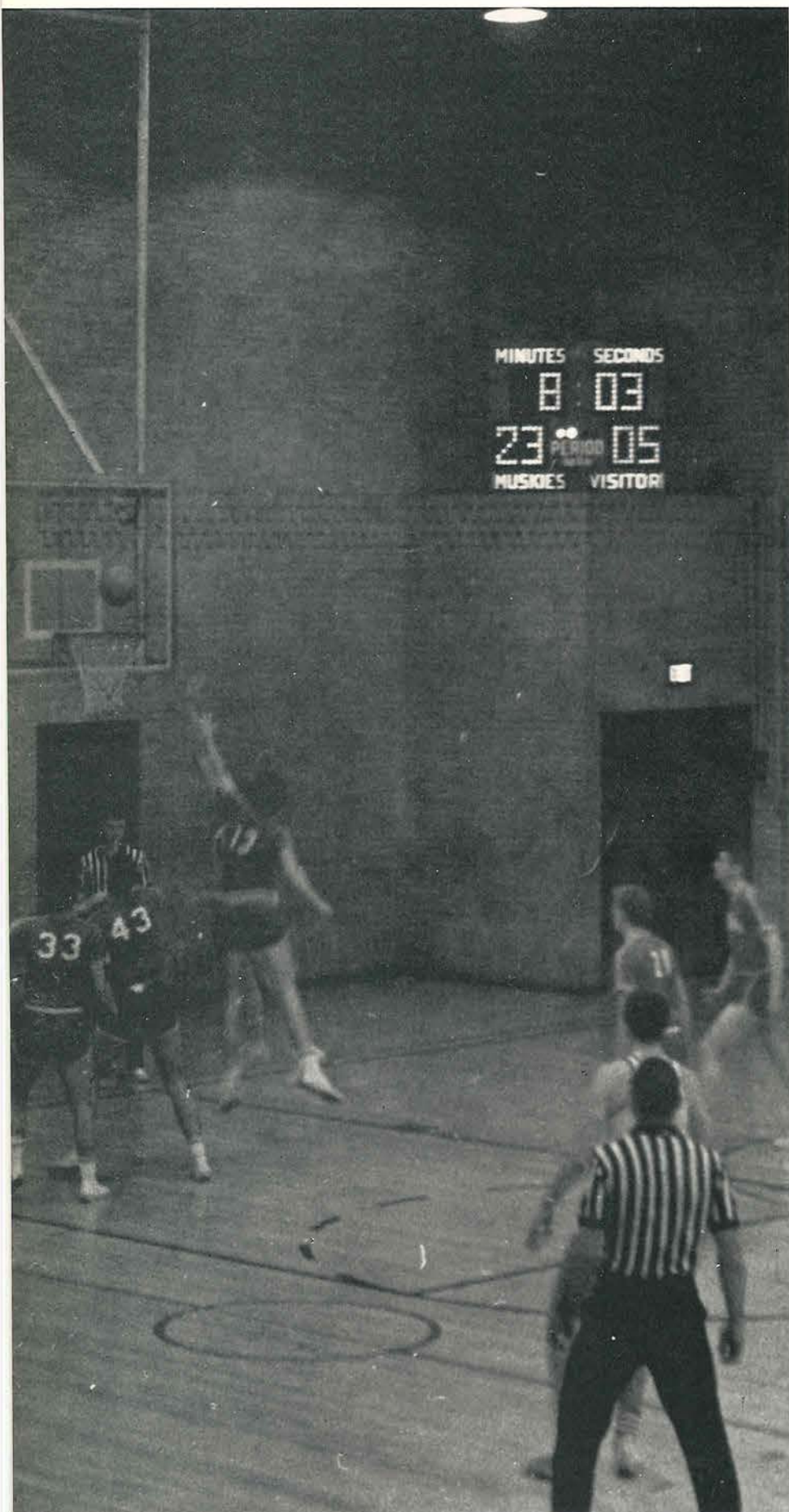

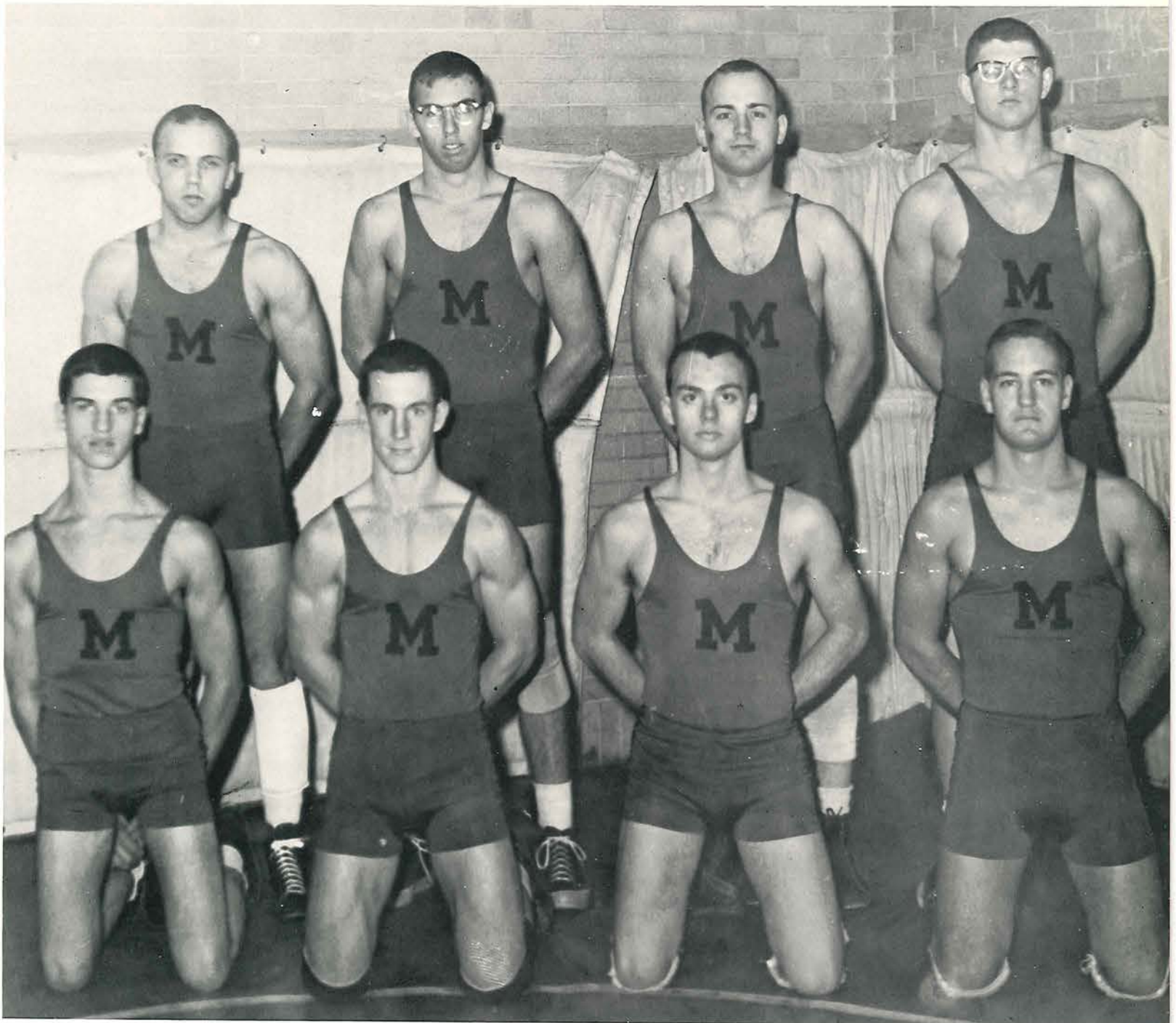

The Muskies beat Bethany 61-34 in the opening meet and then swam to decisive victories over Wooster 52-43, Baldwin-Wallace 62-34, and Hiram 55-39 before tying Denison 47-47. In their second meeting of the season Wooster whipped the Muskies 59-27, but Coach Potter's tankers bounced back to regain their winning form and fight off Wesleyan 49-46 and Akron 48-47. In the next meet, Muskingum tied the powerful Wittenberg team 47½-47½ and then wound up the season by humiliating Denison 57-38.

In the conference meet the swimmers tied for seventh place with Oberlin. Two new pool records were set by the Muskies while almost all of the team records were rewritten.

The Student-Faculty Judiciary Board is a creation of Community Council and the administration to help develop a keen student awareness of responsibility for their actions. Student membership on this board requires a G.P.R. of at least 2.75.

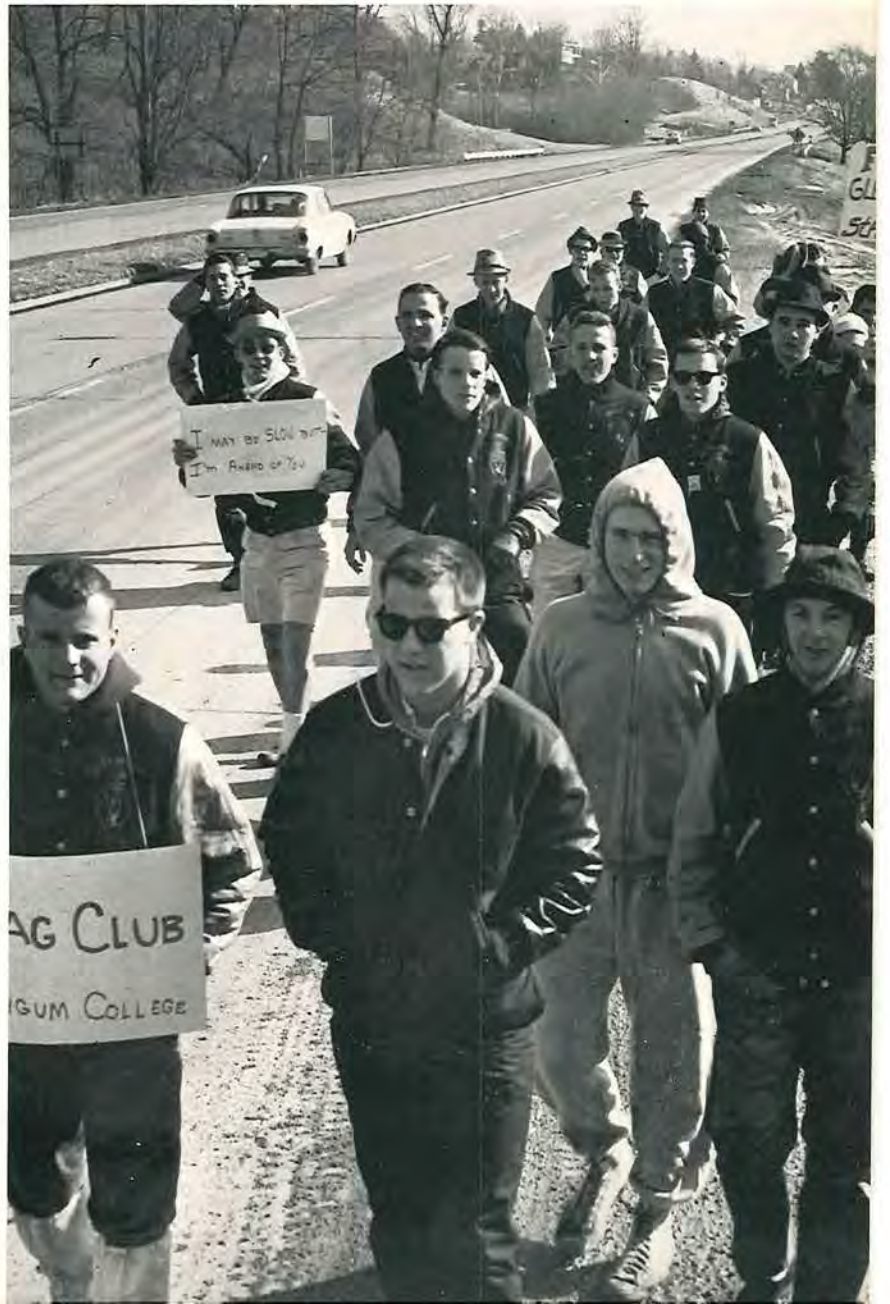
