A program for physical as well as mental development—this is Muskingum—this is her athletic program.

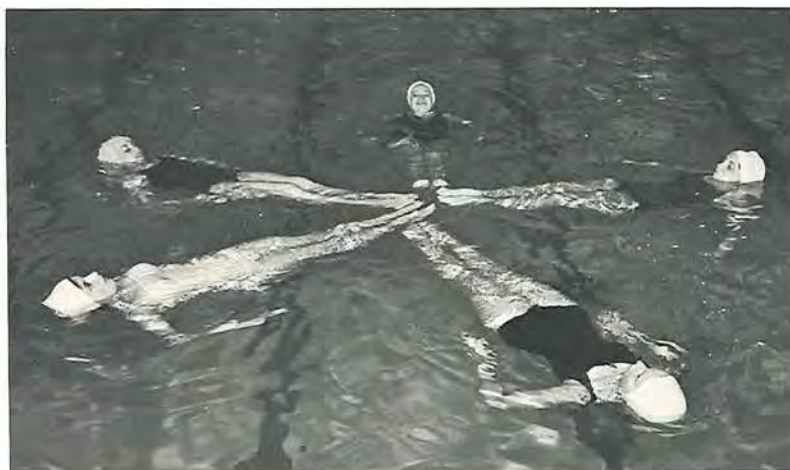

Football



The 1963 Muskie football season opened September 21st before one of the largest small college crowds in the nation, 42,815 people at the Acme-Zip game in Akron. Coach Sherman made no promises, but the team was ready to avenge the last season's loss and get a good start towards the Conference Crown.

The first quarter looked like the beginning of a bruising battle. After the Muskies stopped an Akron drive on the 29, they moved the ball for four first downs behind hard-driving fullback Andy Duda. However, the drive sputtered inside the Akron 30 and the Muskies were unable to sustain another drive during the entire game. The Zips scored in the second quarter to lead 7-0 at the half. The second half was dominated by Akron; the final score was 13-0.

The following week the offense, which was unable to score at Akron, could not be denied by the Pioneers of Marietta. Dale Dickson led the onslaught with three long touchdown runs. The Pioneers had their own threat in the passing arm of Terry Heaton who gained 250 yards in the air. However, the Muskingum power and depth was more than enough to subdue Marietta 57-12.



The biggest heartbreaker of the season came against Denison in the first home game. Coach Sherman's boys completely dominated the game in every statistic except one—the ever important score column. It was one of those days when everything went wrong. A field goal attempt hit the crossbar and fell short; a touchdown pass was completed, but the official ruled that it was caught out of the end zone. The final score, Denison 7, Muskingum 6.

Muskingum won the next three games by shutouts. The stalwart defense was led by All-Conference Roger LaLonde at tackle and Jerry Young at middle guard. Other standouts on the big defensive line were end Bob Martin and freshman Mark DeVilling. "T. D." Dillard proved to be more than an ample replacement when Jerry Young was lost for the season in the Mount Union game.

Against the Mounts, a 0-0 halftime tie was broken by a spectacular 81 yard kickoff return by Roger Welsh. Afterwards the offense took on a new look behind the passing of freshman Gary Pelphrey. The final score was 31-0.



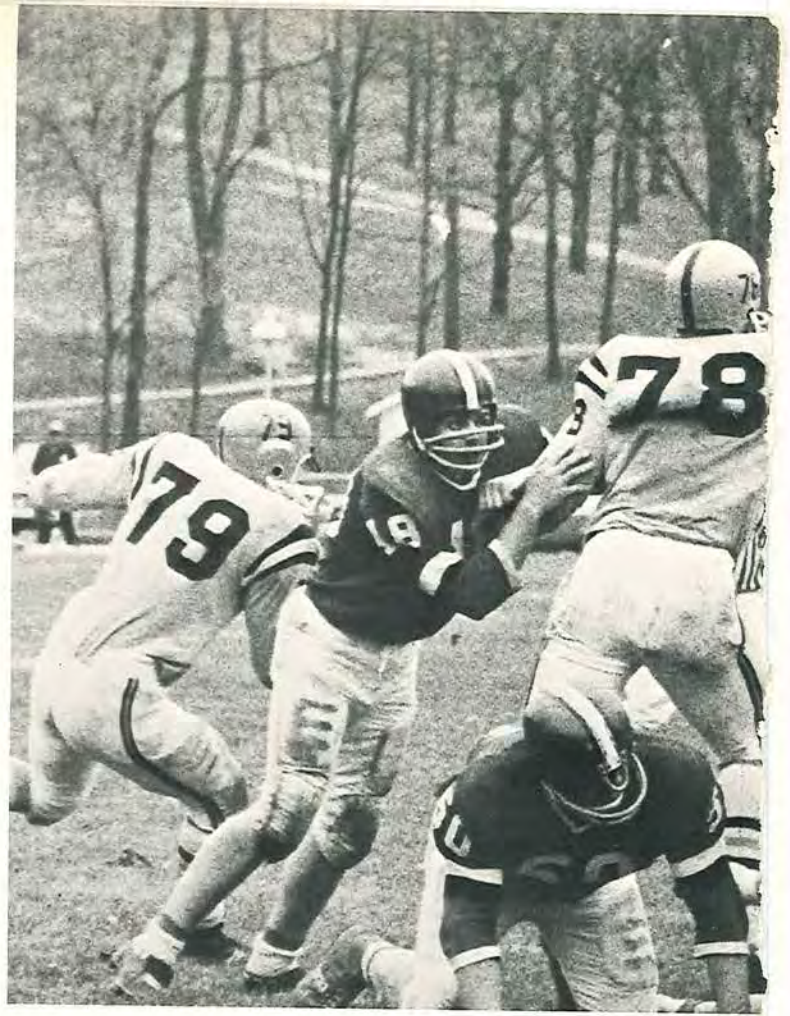

Homecoming against Heidelberg was another defensive battle against a highly fired-up Heidelberg eleven. The Muskies were able to sustain two drives for fourteen points and the victory.

On migration day at Wooster, the Scots were "jinxed" for the fifteenth straight year. A well rounded offensive attack of 190 yards on the ground and 150 in the air produced 28 points while the defense again blanked the opponents.

The following week the Muskies travelled to Uniontown to play non-league for Waynesburg. The air was filled with periodic displays of snow flakes and passes. Yellow Jacket quarterback Theofields launched an aerial attack which completely riddled the Muskingum secondary and sent the Muskies home on the short end of a 24-14 score.

The team quickly rebounded from their defeat at Waynesburg to beat Capital in a hard fought game on the loser's field. Dickson gained 136 yards to lead the offensive attack along with several passes to ends Purselle and Ross. Key defensive plays were interceptions by Andy Duda and Wiley Post that stopped Capital drives.

The season came to a thrilling climax against the always tough Baldwin Wallace team. Playing their best game of the season the Muskies were determined to avenge last season's defeat.





Coaches



Much credit for the traditionally strong football teams at Muskingum must be given to Coach Ed Sherman and his staff. Mr. Sherman, now the dean of Ohio Conference coaches, has recorded 119 victories since coming to Muskin-

gum. Able assistants to Coach Sherman are Joe McDaniel, in charge of defense; Jerry Walke, who handles the J-V squad along with centers and guards; and John Riley, tackle and end coach. Trainer for the team is Les Baum.



Senior Roger Welsh electrified the crowd by returning the opening kickoff to the B.W. 7 yard line. From there Muskingum was able to score and go into an early lead, 7-0. The ball then changed hands several times with the Yellow Jackets driving to the Muskingum goal line in the closing minutes of the first half. There the defense got tough and stopped B.W. within a foot of the goal. From this position Welsh again stepped in to get the Muskies out of a hole with a tremendous 73 yard punt. In the third and early part of the fourth quarter the hard charging defense turned back several B.W. drives in Muskingum territory. Linebackers Duda and Rohrer assisted the hard charging front line in stopping the Jackets. Late in the fourth quarter the Muskies

again drove to within the ten yard line where DeVilling added three points by a field goal.

Ending on a good note, the Muskies finished the season with a 6-3 record. High respect for Muskingum in the Ohio Conference was shown by the selection of five Muskies to the All-Conference first team and three more to the second team. Roger LaLonde, defensive tackle; Jerry Young, defensive middle guard; and Dick Rider, offensive center; received recognition for the second straight year. Roger Welsh, defensive safety; and Dale Dickson, offensive halfback; were included on the first team, while Roger Post, Bob Martin, and Lenny Anderson were members of the All-Conference second team.

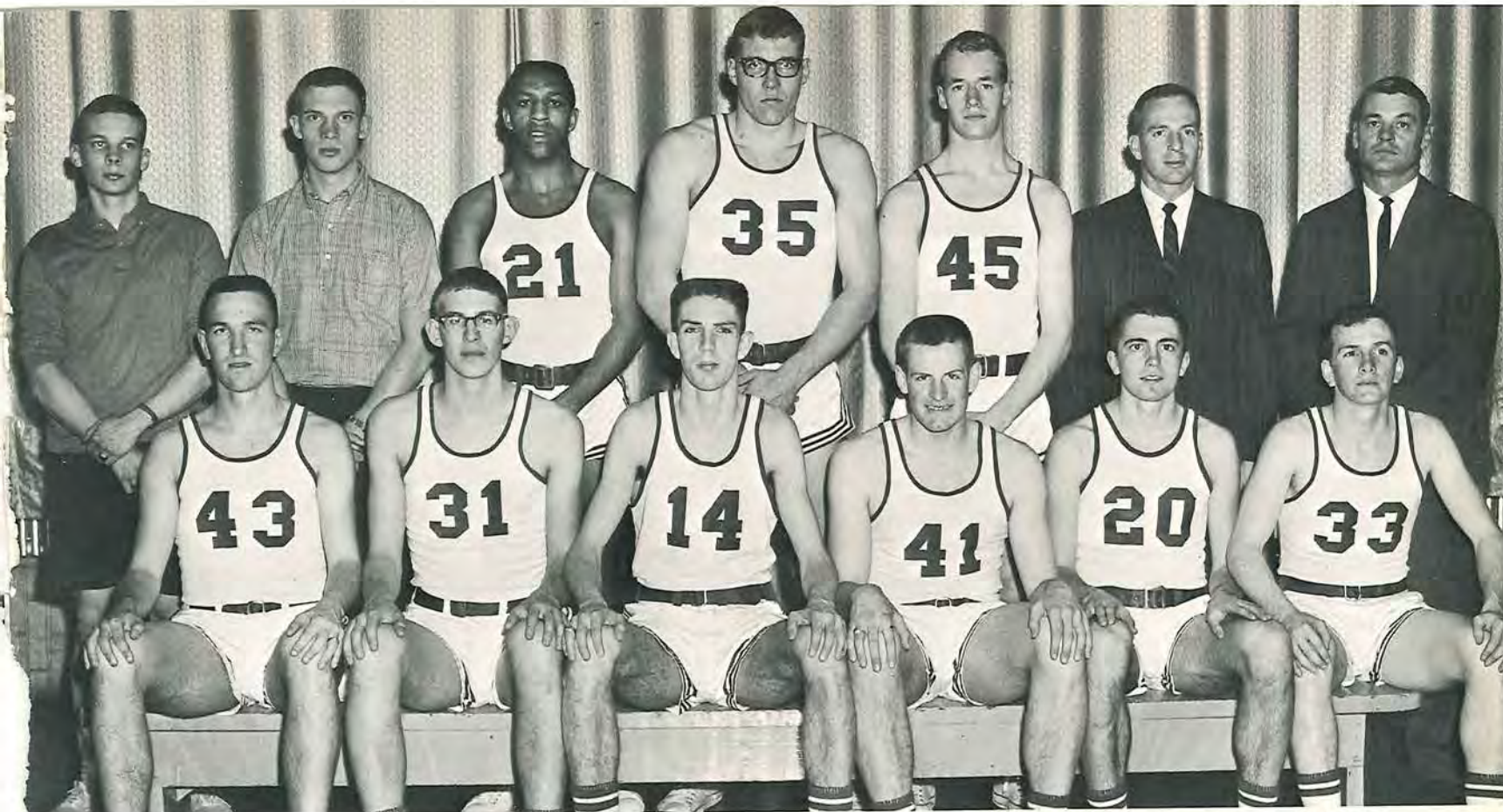

1964 was a year of ups-&-downs for the Muskie basketballers. Having one of the toughest schedules of any Ohio college team, they found the going rough, although in several cases the young team was able to give opponents resounding defeats.

The season started on a low note with losses in the first four games. However, not to be discouraged, they fought back to win four of the next six games, the two losses being in hard-fought games to always tough Wittenberg and non-conference foe, Gannon. Approaching mid-season the Muskie hoopsters got a taste of big-time basketball, facing two of the better teams in the nation, Ohio University and Duquesne. The Muskies found themselves on the low end of 76-58 and 89-49 scores. Back in the conference the Muskies found the going a little easier, swishing the nets for 103 and 95 points in consecutive games against Kenyon and Baldwin-Wallace. The two biggest disappointments of the season came in losses to Marietta and Denison. After holding a fourteen point lead against Marietta, an end of





the game flurry pushed the Pioneers ahead by five points. The next game was just as close, with Denison winning by three. The season ended with a 67-55 victory over Mt. Union. In the Conference tournament Muskingum lost in the final round to Marietta 83-77.

The final record for the team stood at 7 wins and 13 losses. Although the record indicates a mediocre season, it certainly can't be termed as a complete disappointment. Many of the losses came to tough non-conference competition. The actual record for the conference was an even 7-7. Highlights of the season were the close contest with conference champs Wittenberg, and the breaking of the century mark against Kenyon.

Joe Arganbright received the honor of All-Ohio Conference first team. He led the team with an average of 19.4 points per game, his high game being 30 points against Marietta. Another outstanding performer was Fred Vollrath, who led the team in field goal percentage with 51 and in free throws with over 71 percent. He was also second highest scorer with an 11.3 average. Dale Featheringham led in rebounds with almost 8 per game.

Arganbright and Vollrath, honorary co-captains of the team, will be returning next year along with six other varsity lettermen. The only graduating senior on the team was Bob Coleman, who completed his third varsity season.

However, the important function of the J.V.'s is to provide experience for future varsity talent. 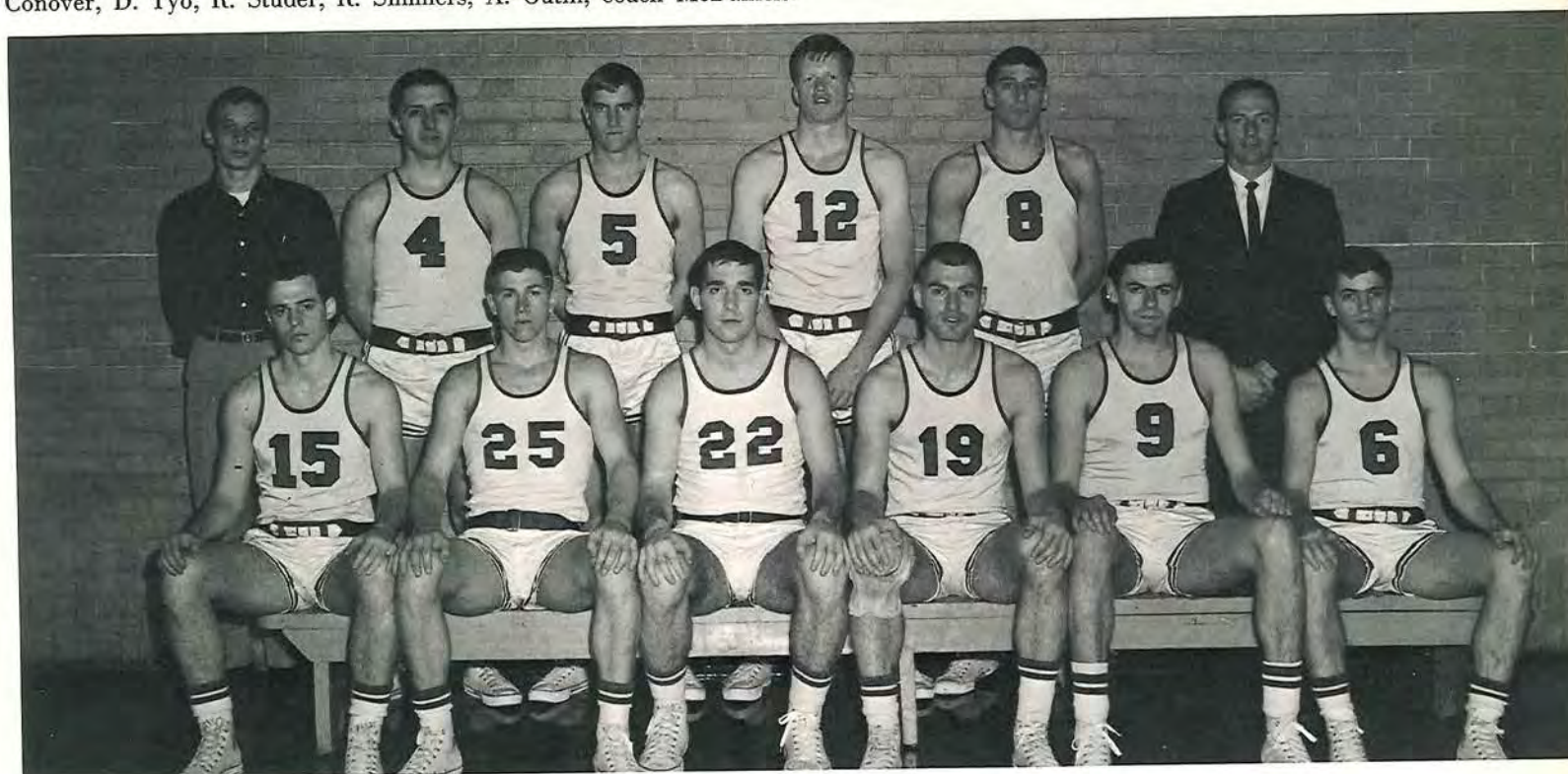

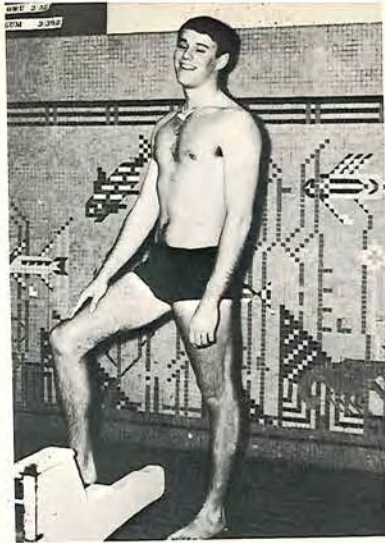
200 yard free-styles. Captain Dave Kerr set the record in 200 yard butterfly, while freshman Bill Davidson set a new backstroke mark.

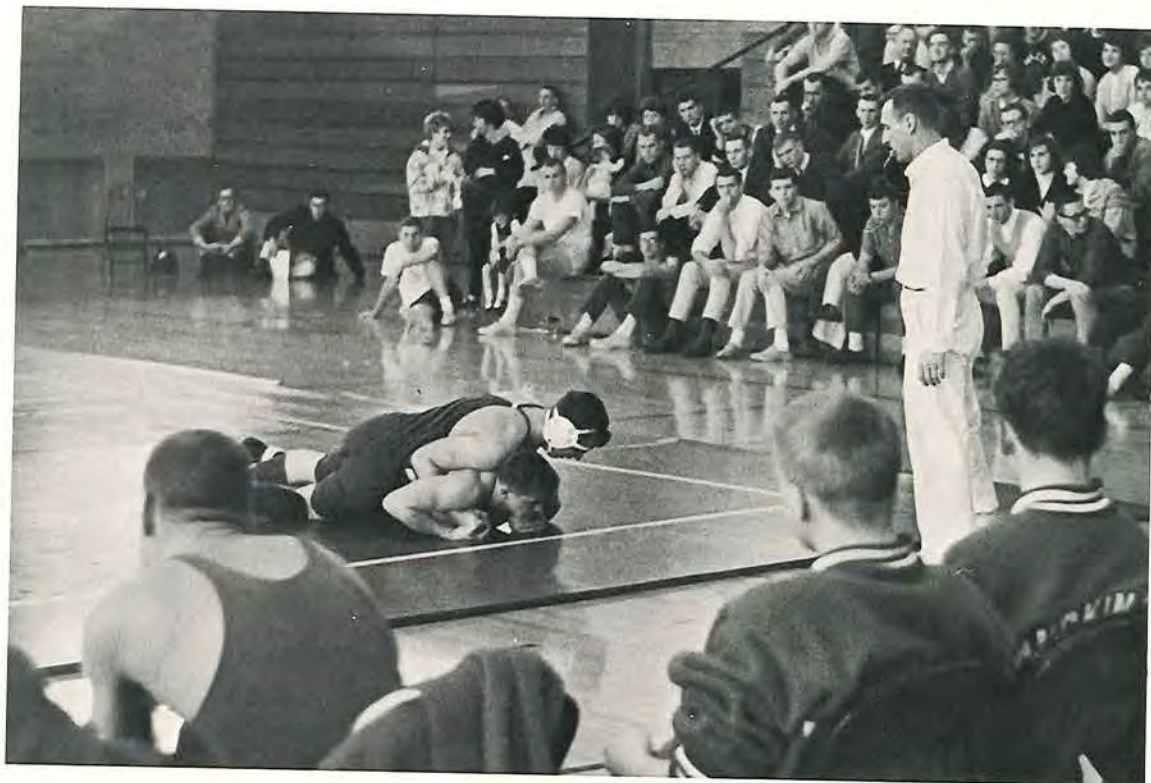

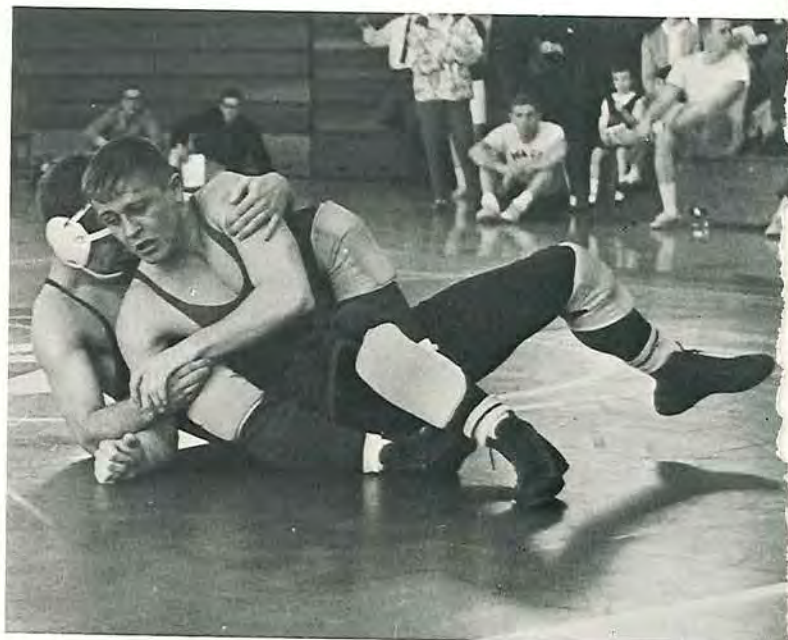




Wrestling

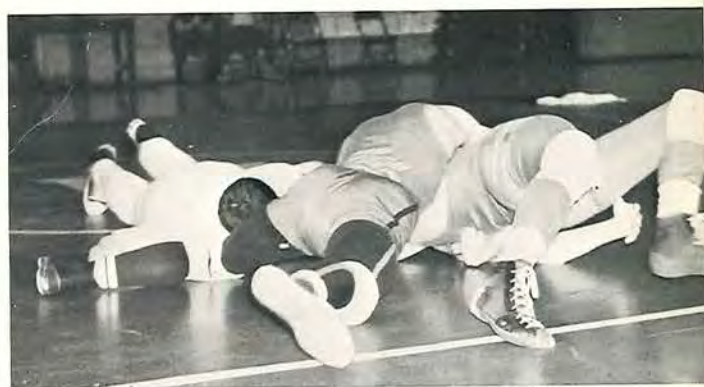

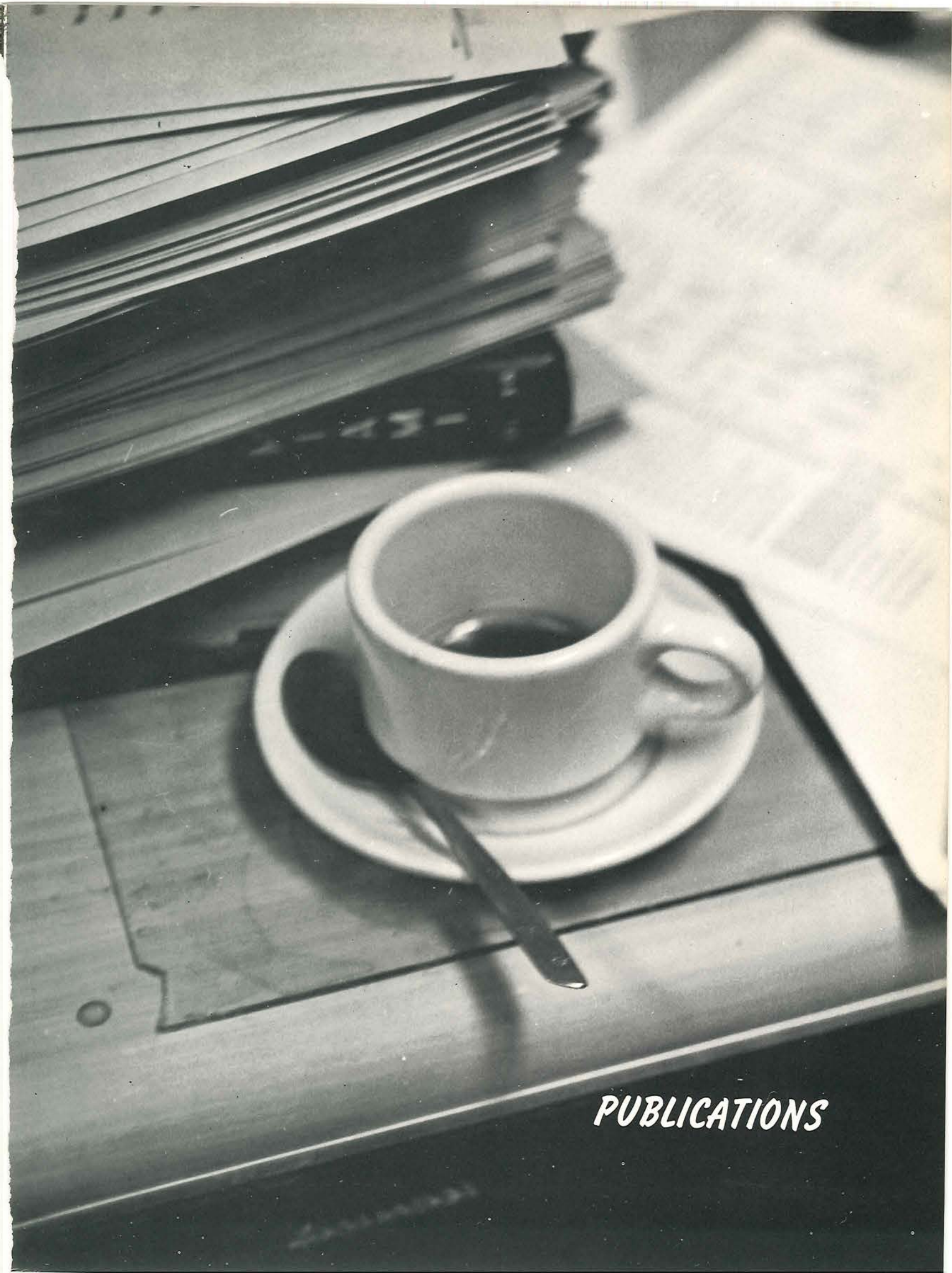
Under the able coaching of Dr. James Golden, the debaters have explored the topic—Resolved: That the federal government should guarantee an opportunity for higher education to all qualified students.
