Through experiences and friend-











The group stayed in the Wildlife Action Lodge while staying in Whiteville, N.C., for the week.













a spring break trip to remember

D uring the week of Spring Break this year, March 12-16, a group of 10 dedicated

students and three members of the Muskingum faculty experienced a unique Spring Break.

The group joined the Mennonite Disaster Service (MDS), centered in Whiteville, North Carolina.

Over the five day period, the students worked alongside a team from Canada to insulate, drywall, and side on the home of a couple whose home had been destroyed by the flooding brought about by Hurricane Floyd in 1999 and again by fire.

The majors of the participating students included such disciplines as English, business, and molecular biology. Despite the differences between them, all of the students shared the desire to help with the project and grow from the experience.

After the five days of hard, physical work had ended, the students took a

well-deserved break on Saturday at the Wrightsville Beach in North Carolina.

The group returned to Muskingum's campus on Sunday, just in time to get ready for classes on Monday morning.

The purpose of the Mennonite Disaster Service is as follows:

"Mennonite Disaster Service is the organized response of our churches to the needs of 'neighbors' in the time of disaster. We endeavor, in the spirit of Christian love, to follow Christ's example by giving time, talents, and energies to help relieve suffering caused by disasters. We understand the ministries of listening, cleanup, repair, reconstruction to be examples of 'the cup of cold water' given to those in need in the name of Christ."





O ver 300 Muskie seniors graduated this year, representing the largest graduating

class. Commencement was a day on which the College recognized the accomplishments of the seniors -- and noted the beginnings of post-Muskingum lives and successes.

The sermon at the baccalaureate service was delivered by Martha C. Moore, a former faculty member of the College in the Department of Communications. Moore, a recipient of the College's Distinguished Alumni Award in 1986, advised the graduates to take an active role in community service. Miss Moore was inducted into the Ohio Women's Hall of Fame by Governor George Voinovich in 1991.

During the commencement activities, Reverend Jane Power Mykrantz, member of the Board of Trustees, offered the invocation. Following the traditional hymn, "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past," President Steele recognized retiring faculty members Dr. David Quinn in biology, Dr. Vishnu Saksena in biology, The commencement address was given by Robert L. Dilenschneider, founder and chairman of The Dilenschneider Group -- a New York-based corporate strategic counseling and communications firm.

Mr. Dilenschneider told graduating seniors that many important challenges lay ahead for today's graduates, and he wished them well in their future academic and professional work.

Jonathan Enlow, a chemistry major, displayed enthusiasm and a sense of humor as the senior class representative during his address to his classmates.

Following his speech, Dr. Jim Dooley, assistant professor of biology and conservation science, gave the traditional faculty charge to the seniors.

Highlights of the ceremony included performances by the Concert Choir, solo vocalist and senior Ashley Musser, and the Wind Ensemble.





Planning began for the first homecoming with President Anne C. Steele, Muskingum's 20th president. The theme for this year's homecoming was established as "Keep the Classics... Steele the Future."

A new parking lot was being constructed behind Finney Hall. The lot was designed to accommodate 46 cars, an increase of 28, with improved handicapped spaces. According to James Heidler, director of physical plant services, plans for the new addition were made last October and November.

Muskingum students and faculty members traveled Sept. 8 to southern Muskingum County for a cookout and camp-out at The Wilds. Thirty-eight students camped out. Students from Mt. Saint Joseph began a quarrel with students from Muskingum during halftime at the Sept. 2 opening football game at McConagha Stadium. Janet Heeter-Bass, Dean of Student Life, said that the Mt. Saint Joseph students were frustrated by the 30-0 score at the half, causing them to be "less smart and more excited." Later, the game was delayed twice because of lightning. Eventually, the game was resumed and Muskingum won the contest, 42-14.

Students living in Patton Hall were awakened on the morning of Friday, Sept. 15, when the fire alarms in the dorm sounded without a scheduled drill or fire. Public Safety and the fire department found the source of the problem while students waited outside in chilly temperatures.

The 16th annual Community Day was held Sept. 23 on campus. The day began with a picnic on the Quad at 5:30. The event featured clowns, Quad chalking, face painting, a live WMCO broadcast, music performed by the Spirit Band and an art show at the Palmer Art Gallery. After the picnic, the football team took on Wilmington College at 7 p.m.

Enrollment this fall for full-time undergraduate students was around 1515, according to Jeff Zellers, Dean of Enrollment. The number is up from last year's 1468 count due to retention rather than growth, Zellers explained. "We know now that we're not going to grow as rapidly and we can't grow," Zellers said. "The growth which was fairly rapid is now moderating."







Oliver North spoke to the Muskingum College Republicans and other attendants at the Zanesville Country Club. The "Lincoln Reagan Event" was held in an effort to benefit Muskingum College and Muskingum County Republicans. Jim Hockaday, vice president of the Muskingum College Republicans, said, "Everyone involved with the event was ecstatic with the way it went, from the speaker to the food to the atmosphere." In his speech, North focused on the changes in the White House that have occurred not only in the past forty years, but the changes that will come with Presiedent George W. Bush's administration. "We cannot survive without focusing on the education of our youth," North told the enthusiastic audience.

Renovation and building projects are planned for about the next ten years to increase campus capabilities, said Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Ransom Clark. 



























Muskies Climb Ladder in OAC Standings

In a season that could have ended for better or for worse, the Muskingum football team finished in the middle.

Finishing with an overall record of 4-6 and a record of 3-6 in the Ohio Athletic Conference, good for sixth, it can easily be said that the Muskies enjoyed a good season.

Winning three games in impressive fashion, and losing two by a combined total of 11 points, the Muskies seemed to have always put themselves in good position to win.

Starting off on fire, the Muskies crushed the College of Mount St. Joseph in their first-ever meeting, before encountering the top teams in the conference in their first OAC match-ups of the season.

Bouncing off of two heartbreaking losses, the Muskies rebounded in a major way with an emotional win over rival Marietta.

With nine seconds remaining on the game clock in the fourth quarter, senior kicker Kevin Smith split the uprights on a 23 yard field goal, giving the Muskies their first OAC win of the season.

The following week the Muskies encountered another thriller at Capital. A see-saw battle throughout, the Muskies beat Capital on a nine-yard touchdown pass to Luke Thimmes with 2:57 remaining in the fourth quarter.

The final home game of the season against Heidelberg marked an historic one. Not only did the Muskies win, but the seniors played their final game in McConagha Stadium and senior quarterback Jeff Morris shined one more time.

Morris compiled a school record of total offense in a game with 344 total yards in the win. Other records achieved by Morris in his final year were career passing yards, career touchdown passes and career total ofensive yards. For his efforts Morris was named honorable mention all-OAC his senior year.

Senior offensive lineman Jim Kornokovich also closed out his fine career with style. A first team all-OAC selection, and honorable mention all-American selection by usafootball.com, Kornokovich was also a third team All-North Region selection by, the Football Gazette, and a AFCA Aztec Bowl participant.

Senior Jason Gatewood was named second team all-OAC. Senior Brad Mercer was named first team academic all-OAC, while fellow senior Smith was second team all-OAC and an honorable mention All-American by usafootball.com. Junior Brad DeHays was named second team all-OAC and third team All-North Region by Football Gazette. Junior Matt Colvin was first team academic all-OAC.






Lady Muskies Maintain Winning Tradition

Coming off their best finish in school history, the Lady Muskie volleyball team headed into competition with high expectations. They didn't disappoint.

Despite losing four seniors in the starting line-up from a year ago, the Lady Muskies were, once again, able to be among the top teams in the league. Led by versatile senior setter Kristen Vejsicky, the Lady Muskies were able to finsh third in the Ohio Athletic Conference during the regular season, and also advance into the OAC tournament. The spikers were able to close out the season with 7-2 record in the OAC and 24-7 overall.

Although Muskingum's string of undefeated seasons was snapped after two years of total dominance in the first match-up of the season versus Ohio Northern, the Lady Muskies responded like the champions they were.

Losing just one more OAC match-up to the eventual OAC champions, Baldwin-Wallace, Muskingum made yet another run toward OAC gold.

In the OAC tournament Muskingum hosted the quarterfinal, in which they faced Otterbein. Winning in three straight sets over the Lady Cardinals, Muskingum found themselves sitting in familiar territory, the OAC final four. However, this season the Lady Muskies had to make a trip to compete.

At Ohio Northern for the OAC tournanment, Muskingum had the opportunity to avenge their early season loss to the Lady Yellow Jackets of Baldwin-Wallace. Unfortunately, Muskingum couldn't survive the sting of B-W after nearly coming back in all three sets, leaving everything they had on the floor.


At the conclusion of the final game of the season, Head Coach Elizabeth Zicha decided this final game would be the conclusion of her coaching career at Muskingum College. A legend in the Division III coaching ranks, Zicha spent 16 years at the helm of the nationally prominent program, earning well over 400 wins.

The end of the season also marked the end of another kind. Vejsicky, the

Muskies' lone senior, finished her prestigious career in style. Leaving Muskingum as the most dominant setter in school and OAC history, Vejsicky shattered nearly every record as a setter. A three-time all-OAC selection, Vejsicky became the OAC's all-time leader in assists compiling 4,290 in her career, also becoming Muskingum's all-time leader in assists. On the year Vejsicky went out in style with 1,076 assists, 234 digs, 58 blocks, and 30 serving aces.

This year Vejsicky earned first team all-OAC honors, OAC Clyde Lamb Award winner, first team Verizon Academic all-District, first team academic all-OAC, and third team Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-American.

Junior middle-hitter Ashley Layman also enjoyed a brilliant year, as she was named first team all-OAC, AVCA all-Great Lakes region, and first team academic all-OAC.








First-year midfielder Jan Gintz pushes the ball ahead of the competition in a home game. Gintz played a lot of minutes on this year's team that featured many uprising stars.

Led by a pair of first-year runners on both the men's and women's side, the 2000 cross country team not only took care of business this year, but demonstrated many signs of a promising future.

Under the first-year instruction of Coach Kris Boey the men's team finished seventh in the OAC totaling 189 points, while also finishing 21st in the NCAA Regional. The women's team was able to reel off a sixth place finish in the OAC with 175 points, as they also came in 22nd in the NCAA Regional.







High Expectations Nearly Achieve OAC Gold

Picked to finish third in the Ohio Athletic Conference during the 2000-01 season, the men's basketball team did a little better. Although they finished the regular season as the number seven team with a 7-11 OAC record, and an overall record of 14-14, the Muskies played in the OAC tournament like champions.

Advancing to the OAC championship game as the #7 seed, the Muskies nearly accomplished what many people thought was unattainable-- an OAC title and an NCAA tournament birth.

Playing the then number one team in the country, the Ohio Northern Polar Bears, the Muskies were able to control the tempo of the game throughout the first half heading into the locker room with not only a lead, but momentum. However, a second half plagued by cold shooting, and an impressive showing by Northern, not only ended the dream, but the careers of three fine seniors.

Chris Garber, Scott Lamonica and Chas Call all contributed in more ways than one to the Muskie basketball program. These three seniors set the standard for future Muskie teams, not only on the floor, but as student-athletes.

Garber leaves Muskingum as an elite member of the 1,000-point scoring club, surpassing the century mark in his senior season, while also etching his name in the Muskingum record book. Garber became Muskingum's all-time leading rebounder during the 2000-01 season, accumulating more than 673 boards to pass up Fred Vollrath, the former record holder.

The 2000-01 season held high expectations for the Muskies, but as Head Coach Jim Burson stated throughout the season, "Expectations can be mean."

Climbing to the top of the OAC and nearly scraping the bottom, both seemed to happen to the Muskies this season. Winners of seven straight in the middle of the season, which included the championship of their own holiday tour-

nament, the Muskies were flying high. The second half of the season took its toll on the Muskies dropping them by a reseasonable margin in the OAC standings.

Able to pull off back-to-back conference wins in the final two games of the regular season, Muskingum used the momentum to put together the historic run at OAC gold.

Post-season awards included all-OAC second team honors going to both Garber and junior guard Mike Moler. Moler led the team in scoring with 14 points per game, while Garber led the team in rebounds with 7.4 a game, assists with 102 on the season, and was second on the team in scoring with 12.7 points a game.





Lady Muskies Make History in Tournament

No one knew what to expect out of the 2000-01 women's basketball team. Led by first year Head Coach Keri Hamsher, and a line-up stacked with underclassmen, the Lady Muskies definitely made the most out of a season in which they were looked down upon by their opponents.

The Lady Muskies chalked up a 3-15 record in the OAC this year, while finishing 8-19 overall.

Just as their counterparts, the men's basketball team, did, the Lady Muskies proved that they could play in a time when it mattered most, the OAC tournament.

Labeled as the #10 seed in the tournament, the Lady Muskies had a lot of work to do. They graciously accepted the challenge. Never in the history of the OAC tournament, men's or women's, has a #10 seed won a quarter-final game to advance to the OAC's Final Four. "Never in the history" can now be changed to "once in the history" because the Lady Muskies pulled off the unthinkable.

Defeating Marietta in impressive fashion to open up the tourney, the Lady Muskies made the trek to Capital to take on the heavy favorite and nationally ranked Lady Crusaders in a quarter-final match-up. Despite having lost to the Crusaders in the previous two meetings by a total of 68 points and a lack of fan support, the Lady Muskies played, knowing that they needed a win to proceed in the tournament.

Able to keep it close headed into the locker room at the half, the Lady Muskies used intensity, mixed with a lot of pride in the second half, to finish up the job of knocking Capital off their pedestal on which they once sat

so highly. The Lady Muskies won that game to advance to the semi-final game at Mount Union where their season came to an abrupt halt.

Bringing back the same cast of players to take the floor next season, the memorable tournament run showed the entire conference that the Lady Muskies will be ready to play in 2001-02.

Leading the Lady Muskies in 2000-01 was sophomore post player Jessica Gates. Gates ripped the nets for 16.5 points a game, while also grabbing 8.7 rebounds per contest. Gates earned second team all-OAC for her efforts.

Junior guard Stephanie Bishop scored 12.4 points a game, while making a team high 25 3-pointers.





Muskies Send Two Wrestlers to Nationals

Playing the role of defending Ohio Athletic Conference Champions coming into the 2000-01 season, the Muskie wrestlers earned some much deserved respect prior to the season opener, as they were ranked 20th in all of Division III. The grapplers finished the year placing fourth in the OAC with a conference record of 3-4, and an overall record of 10-9.

During mid-season an unexpected coaching move took its toll on the team, but the problem was quickly resolved. Former Head Coach Tony Cipollone left the program that he helped get back on its feet for an opportunity to do it again somewhere else. Fortunate for the Muskies, assistant coach Bob Fox was able to step right in and make the Muskies a contender once again.

At the OAC Championships the Muskies enjoyed a good showing, which nearly got them another OAC title, but a few mistakes cost the team the repeat. However, many Muskies saw the light at the end of the tunnel and reached for it.


Senior Wade Chapman, a preseason All-American, overcame a midseason knee injury to wrestle his best one more time. Chapman easily claimed an OAC title in the 197-pound weight class, punching his ticket to the NCAA Championships in Waterloo, Iowa. Fellow senior Billy Hockaday also earned himself a trip to the big dance in his final go-round as a Muskie. Hockaday captured the 133-pound weight class OAC crown, to send him to the NCAA Championships as well.

Sophomore José Smith was the next Muskie in line for the trip, but his efforts in the OAC Championships left him with a close second place finish in the 125-pound weight class. Smith finished the season with an 11-14 record. Sophomore Nick Swaldo and senior Seth Youngen both finished third at the OAC Championships in the 141 and 157 weight classes, respectively. Senior Rocco Russo closed out his career with a fourth place finish in the heavyweight division.

At the NCAA Championships, Chapman made history by becoming a

first team All-American. Ironically, Chapman finished seventh in the 197-pound weight class, just as he was picked to do in the preseason. Chapman finished the year with a record of 25-4 and his career with a record of 99-26. Hockaday was able to claim one victory at the championships, contributing with Chapman to earn Muskingum a 35th place finish in the nation. Hockaday didn't come home emptyhanded, as he was named as a third team academic All-American.

On the year Hockaday was also the OAC Clyde Lamb Award winner, a first team academic all-OAC selection, and an OAC Champion. Chapman was a first team academic all-OAC. Smith received all-OAC honors as well.








Muskie Linksters Get in the National Spotlight

The use of the word "successful" to describe what the 2000-01 men's golf team accomplished would be an understatement. The Muskie linksters stunned the Ohio Athletic Conference in 2001 with a second place finish in the OAC, while putting Muskie golf back on the national map. An impressive 12th place finish out of 24 teams at the NCAA Division III Championships has finally earned the Muskies the respect they much deserve. On the season the Muskies had a 183-25 win/loss record.

With the addition of sophomore standouts Adam and Ryan Lescalleet in the off-season the Muskies became a team to beat. Claiming first place in four tournaments in 2000-01, from both the fall and spring schedule, Muskingum prospered on the course throughout the season.

At the OAC Championships, the Muskies were able to claim a second place finish, only behind national powerhouse, Otterbein. With their second place finish, and an eye-popping overall record, the Muskies were invited with an at-large bid into the NCAA Championships.

While competing against the nation's best, the Muskies proved they belonged. Improving in the overall standings every day of the tournament and ending with a 12th place finish in all of Division III, the best in school history, the Muskies have a bright future on the horizon.

Without losing any players to graduation, the Muskies will return the same cast of players in 2001-02. Of those returning, three players and a coach were labeled as some of the OAC's elite in 2000-01.

Head Coach Ed DiGenova was recognized for the turn around of the Muskingum golf program in just his second year at the helm, as he was tabbed the OAC Coach of the Year in 2001. Sophomore Brian Higgins was

an all-OAC selection in 2001 with a 10th place finish at the OAC Championships. Brothers Ryan and Adam set the OAC on fire in 2001 with second and fourth place finishes respectively at the OAC Championships, earning both of them all-OAC honors. Adam was also named to the all-District team by the Golf Coaches Association of America.

Tennis Continuously Improving

Both the men's and women's tennis teams proceeded down the road of continuous improvement in 2001, moving up in the Ohio Athletic Conference standings. The Lady Muskies finished with a 2-8 overall record, winning both of those matches in the OAC, as they compiled a conference record of 2-7, earning them a tie for eighth place. The men's team did one better than their counterparts, ending the season with a 3-7 record overall and 3-6 in the OAC for sixth place.

At the OAC Championships, the Lady Muskies earned their team point when sophomore Shannon Close outlasted an Otterbein player, 3-6, 7-6, 6-0, in the first round of the number three singles bracket. Close exited the tournament in the quarter final round, giving her a team best 6-6 singles record. Muskingum finished tied with Marietta in the final standings, as they both completed their seasons in eighth place.

Looking at the season as a whole, the Lady Muskies were able to put up some good numbers. First-year student athletes Whitney Reichheld, Kylie Peters, Kurenn Sisler and Megan Strahota were all able to tally three single match wins on the season, making the future look promising for the women's tennis program. During the season, Strahota earned OAC Player of the Week honors.

On the men's side the OAC Championships were more generous. The Muskie men placed seventh at the end of the year tourney. Muskingum totaled four points in the tournament, with help coming from seniors Drew Hendley and Juan Carlos Lopez.

In the number one singles bracket, Hendley advanced to the semifinals with a 6-2, 6-3 victory over a Mount Union opponent. Hendley then

fell in the quarterfinals in a three-set decision. Hendley finished the season with a team best seven singles victories.

Lopez, playing in the number four singles bracket, defeated a Wilmington opponent 6-2, 6-3, but then was tripped up in the next round. Lopez and senior Kurt Hall each posted six singles victories during the 2001 campaign.

Other team points in the tournament came from doubles partners Hall and sophomore Nic Fioritto. Hall and Fioritto defeated a Heidelberg doubles team 6-1, 6-2 in the first round of the tournament.

In 2001, first-year Head Coach Kris Boey began the renovation of the Muskingum track program. To his advantage not much work was needed, as a group of determined upperclassmen, and a handful of first-years, were able to carry both the men's and women's team to good fortune. In the Ohio Athletic Conference, the men's team claimed the 7th spot by totaling 57 points at the OAC Championships, while the women's team captured 6th place with 56 points.

Both the men's and women's teams experienced success in 2001, and with good reason. On the men's side, many key contributors helped to guide the team. First-year sprinter/jumper Ryan Spicer had a year that many dream about, turning in quality times and distances throughout the season.

Spicer was named the OAC Field Athlete of the Year for his first place finish in the triple jump and second place finish in the long jump at the OAC Championships. During the indoor season, Spicer participated in the NCAA Championships in the long jump, while also becoming the OAC Champion in the same event.

Keishay Moore. Moore owned the OAC in the 400-meter dash, capturing the title in 58.29 seconds. Her quickness also captured the school record in the same event.





Muskies Tie Record for Most Wins

In 2001 the Muskie baseball team re-established themselves as contenders in the Ohio Athletic Conference. With a noteworthy overall record of 28-16, good enough to tie the school record for most wins in a season, and an OAC mark of 9-9 (5th place), the Muskies were once again on the verge of advancing into the OAC tournament. However, the Muskies were shut out of the post season by just the slimmest of margins.

Despite not achieving their preseason goal, it can be easily noticed that the Muskies had a stellar year in more ways than one.

Rolling through the OAC on a mission to start off the season, the Muskies built a 6-2 record, good enough for first place. Splitting doubleheaders against Heidelberg and Otterbein to start the season, the Muskies then swept doubleheaders from both Wilmington and Capital to set up a showdown with arch rival, Marietta.

Headed into the game versus the Pioneers, the Muskies sat alone in first place with a chance to boost themselves up the ladder. In a game that could possibly make or break the season, it broke it. Unable to pick up a win from Marietta, the Muskies slid down a treacherous downhill slope that resulted in five losses against three wins, leaving the Muskies uninvited to the OAC tournament.

Many individuals enjoyed breakout seasons in 2001, but none more than senior first baseman Justin Shaw. The clean-up hitter for the Muskies, Shaw nearly shattered every offensive record. Shaw broke the school record for single season hits and runs batted in with 77 hits and 66 RBI in his final year as a Muskie. Finishing with a season batting average of .472, Shaw ranked second on Muskingum's single season batting average list. For his career Shaw hit a school record 41 home runs and a school record of 181 RBI's during his tenure. Nearly reaching the school record for career hits, Shaw comes in second with 201, miss-

ing the record by just one hit.

For his efforts, Shaw was rewarded greatly. Selected to the all-Mideast Region team, Shaw was also a first team all-OAC member. Early in the year Shaw was a Collegiate Baseball/Louisville Slugger Division III National Player of the Week.

Other Muskies honored for great seasons include: senior pitcher Adam Davis, second team all-OAC (7-4 record, 2.05 ERA), junior outfielder Matt Edwards, first team all-OAC (.342 BA, 8 HR, 44 RBI), first-year pitcher Nathan Hesler, honorable mention all-OAC (8-1 record), junior catcher Frank Perry, second team all-OAC (.324 BA, .996 FLD%), sophomore outfielder/pitcher Mike Van Schepen, second team all-OAC (.340 BA, 9 HR, 40 RBI), junior Adam Klontz and senior Brad Mercer, honorable mention academic all-OAC.



Tradition Doesn't Graduate; Lady Muskies Become National Champions

Coming into the season many people questioned the talent of the 2001 Lady Muskie softball team after losing the all-time leader in pitching wins last year to graduation; they shouldn't have.

In 2001 the Lady Muskies not only demonstrated that tradition doesn't graduate, but established the standards of Muskie softball teams to come, while shocking the nation in the process. Led by the heart of six seniors, the Lady Muskies pursued the ultimate goal in collegiate athletics without ever second guessing themselves. Forty-seven wins later the Lady Muskies achieved the dream, as they became national champions.

After winning the Central Regional Tournament at Denison University, the Lady Muskies advanced to the Division III College Softball World Series in Eau Claire, Wisconsin, their first trip to the big dance since 1998.

At Gelein Field in Eau Claire, the stage was set for the eight top teams in the country to fight it out with one common goal in mind, but in the end it was the Lady Muskies from Muskingum that took the spotlight and provided the encore.

Marked as the #3 seed and a team to beat, the Lady Muskies stepped onto the field with an abundance of confidence and smiles on their faces. Defeating William Patterson to open the tournament, the Lady Muskies next faced their toughest opponent of the season, St. Mary's of Minnesota. Having been mercied by the Lady Cardinals in the second game of the season, the Lady Muskies took on the #1 team in the country with a better result in mind.

Behind the stellar Muskie defense and solid pitching of senior Dani Keiffer, the Muskies moved on in the World Series unscathed with a 2-0 victory.

In order to advance into the championship game the Lady Muskies would have to get past the #1 seed and perennial power the Central (Iowa) Dutch, and that they did. Senior Chantelle Andrews was the spark the Lady Muskies would need, as she hit a two out double off of the center field fence, plating two Muskie runs. Muskingum won 2-0.

The finale of the World Series saw Muskingum match-up against Central one more time with a chance to be called national champions. The Lady Muskies played the biggest game of their lives flawlessly. Through three and a half innings neither team had scored, then came the bottom of the fourth. (Continued on p. 148).

The Day the Muskies Achieved the Dream

With two outs and a runner on base, junior catcher Shelli Manson blasted a home run that would leave a mark in history. Clearing the centerfield fence with ease, the home run put Muskingum up 2-0.

The very next batter, first-year rightfielder Jen Shay, hit the very next pitch deep as well, for back to back homeruns, giving the Lady Muskies a 3-0 lead that would never be relinguished.

In the top of the seventh inning and with a 4-1 advantage the 2001 Lady Muskies took the field one final time. A sharply hit ground ball to junior third baseman Megan Monsman, then a clean throw to senior Carla Kampschmidt at first base, sealed the deal and ended the final chapter in the story book season, earning the Lady Muskies their first ever national championship.

Not only did the Lady Muskies earn a national championship with their win over Central, but they etched their names in the record book. The historic win placed them in history, as they completed a streak of wins that reached 34 consecutive games, a new record that surpasses their previous mark of 33 set in 2000.

Sunday, May 20, 2001 is the day the Muskies clutched their first ever national championship trophy, where emotions were running at a high. It is a day that will forever live in the memories of those who were there and those people in the entire community, a day when the Lady Muskies will look back at what they accomplished, and a day when they remember a dear mentor and friend who was lost in their search for glory.

Pitching coach John Wells, who helped produce some of the finest pitchers in the area, passed away prior to the game against St. Mary's, while helping guide his protege Keiffer and the Lady Muskies to what would be their first ever national title. Wells was an icon and a key element in the success of the Muskingum softball program.

In Wells' honor the Lady Muskies wore black armbands throughout the final two games of the series, displaying their respect for their coach and close friend.

The dream season was one in which anything was possible, but thanks to six seniors what was possible became a reality.

Many Muskies Honored

With a school record of 47 wins and just six losses, a 17-1 record in the OAC, and a nation best 34 game winning streak, the Lady Muskies left their mark on all those who were fortunate enough to play them.

At season's end credit goes where credit is due and the Lady Muskies earned some of the most recognizable credit in the nation. In claiming their first ever national championship, many Lady Muskies were recognized with various awards.

All-American status points out the best athletes in the country. Muskingum had two of them. Sophomore designated player Mandy Carnes was selected as a first team all-American for the second consecutive year, and her numbers can prove it. Carnes led Muskingum in nearly every offensive category. Carnes was also first team all-Central Region, first team all-OAC, NCAA Central Region all-tournament, and OAC all-tournament.

Senior first baseman Kampschmidt also earned an all-American award. Although Kampschmidt was snubbed by the OAC, only receiving all-OAC second team honors, the National Fastpitch Coaches Association saw things differently. Kampschmidt was a third team all-American for her superb senior season. Other accolades include; first team all-Central Region, second team all-OAC, first team academic all-District IV, unanimous selection first team academic all-OAC, and NCAA Championships all-tournament.

Senior pitcher Keiffer made a name for herself in her senior season with a 30-3 pitching record, and a 1.11 ERA. Keiffer has many awards to prove her success: first team all-Central Region, first team all-OAC, NCAA Championships all-tournament, NCAA Central Region all-tournament, and OAC all-tournament.

Senior shortstop Ryan recieved some recognition as well. Ryan was a second team all-OAC selection, first team academic all-OAC, NCAA Champion-

ships all-tournament, Central Region all-tournament, and OAC all-tournament.

Senior centerfielder Andrews was second team all-OAC. Junior second baseman Shelly DeLucas was second team all-OAC, second team all-Central Region, and a Central Region all-tournament team selection. Junior catcher Tami Anglin was first team all-OAC and first team all-Central Region. Junior third baseman Monsman was selected an NCAA Central Region all-tournament team member, and OAC all-tournament member. Sophomore pitcher Angie Burnside was second team all-OAC.

First-year players Jen Shay and Erin Zupko were also honored. Zupko was first team all-OAC and Shay was on the NCAA Championships all-tournament team and the OAC alltournament team.






















